Paris papers to the 9th March have been received at New-York; they contain nothing new. From which we naturally infer that nothing favorable for the arms of France could be said. Consequently the Russians have been victorious, as given yesterday. The diplomatic corps, headed by Talleyrand, have fled to Berlin; no doubt the army, headed by the emperor, will soon return, if the enemy will permit them. We hear no more about the siege of Graudenz.

The sch. Republican, Brown, of Baltimore, has arrived at Philadelphia.

LONDON, March 25.

We are sorry to learn by the Dutch papers, the loss of the Blanche frigate, near Brest, on the night of the 4th inst. The captain, sir Thomas Lavie, with the whole of the officers and crew, except about thirty of the latter, were fortunately saved.

A messenger has arrived from Vienna, who is said to be the bearer of very satisfactory intelligence respecting the line of conduct by which the emperor of Austria means to regulate himself in future. A report of his having declared war against France, is, we believe, premature.

March 26.

The house of commons was uncommonly crowded with members, about 80 of whom were obliged to take their seats in the side galleries, for want of room in the body of the house.

All the members of the old administration took their seats on the opposition benches as they came in; some, however, inadvertently sat down on the treasury bench at first, but crossed the house on perceiving their mistake, which excited a considerable degree of merriment.

LIVERPOOL, March 28.

Arrived on Wednesday, the American ship Latona, capt. Alden, in 32 days from New-York, having on board the following passengers, who are come to England as witnesses on the trial of captain Whitty, of his majesty's ship Leander, for the murder of Pierce, viz. captain Brewster, of an American revenue cutter, John L. Brewster, his son, Robert Mitchell, and John Pierce, brother of the deceased.

The Hudson, Tombs, which sailed on Wednesday, got ashore on the middle flats, but is off, and gone into dock, and must discharge her cargo to repair.

The Ulysses, from New-York for this port, has a pilot on board.

Arrived, ships Aristides, Williams, and Yorkshire, Lee, from Charleston; Francis, Curtis, Norfolk; Resolution, Brown, Boston; and Washington, New-Orleans.

LOWER ELBE, March 18.

Reports of various kinds have been in circulation here for some days, the authenticity of which, it is impossible to prove or disprove. It seems generally believed, that a new bloody battle has taken place to the disadvantage of the French. A violent quarrel is said to have arisen between Bonaparte and several of his generals, who have resigned. Ducos is said to have been carried, as a state prisoner to France, it having been discovered that he carried on a correspondence with the Austrian ministry. Talleyrand is also said to be in disgrace. The corps diplomatique are mostly arrived at Berlin. An Esterhazy came yesterday from Mr. Dourman our Syndic, who it is said is coming home. It is positively affirmed, and as it should seem with some ground, that general Oudinot with 18,000 men has been forced to surrender for want of provisions. The Copenhagen newspapers, arrived yesterday, bring accounts of the proceedings of the Russians to the 23d February. Since the 8th there had been almost daily engagements in which the French had lost considerably. From the 13th to the 20th, they are stated to have lost 50,000 men.

Sketch of the Scenery and Pantomime. Scene first represents a view of the city of Orleans, and the outside of a convent (the inside illuminated, which is reflected thro' the windows) where the piece opens with a GRAND CHORUS AND PROCESSION

Of Friars and Nuns, in celebration of the annual custom of a requiem, to the memory of the king's sister (the empress Bellisante,) supposed dead.

GRAND TRIUMPHAL ENTRY OF THE KING OF FRANCE, Attended by his Grand Cross, Grand Crozier Nobles, Banner-bearers, Choristers, General Officers, Nuns, Friars, Armour-bearers, Pages, Standards, Soldiers, &c.

THE CONVENT GARDEN DEVELOPEMENT Inside the King's Palace, where he is seated, surrounded by the Nobles, on the Throne of State. In this scene a complaint is presented against the Wild Man of the Woods, and a Reward offered to the several Knights to take him dead or alive; they all refuse except Valentine, who, after making a vow to rescue the country from the Monster, or lose his own life in the attempt, takes a respectful leave of the King and Princess Eglantine, with whom he falls violently in love.

Scene 5th. The Forest of Orleans. The Bear's Cave, where Orson has been nursed, is seen: she is heard growling for the absence of Orson, who is in search of prey for her; they after some time meet; he with food and she ready to devour it; they enter the cave to regale on some animals destroyed by him for that purpose, when Valentine arrives in search of Orson. Encounter between the Wild Man and Hugo (Valentine's attendant) which ends in the escape of the latter from the former.

Valentine meets Orson, and is obliged at first to save himself from his ferocious enemy by climbing the trees of the forest, and making his escape, from close pursuit, from branch to branch, till at last descend, and a furious battle ensues—Valentine nearly exhausted, opposes a polished shield to Orson, in which he sees his own figure, and in consequence remains for some time inactive, surprised and astonished at the effect produced—at last he pulls up a tree by the roots, with which he renews the attack, during which, Valentine escapes many dreadful blows, and when on the point of being vanquished the Bear enters—Valentine steps forward to plunge his sword into her body, which totally disarms Orson, who throws from him the Weapons of Death, and supplicates for the preservation of her he supposes his parent. After a variety of struggles on both sides, the Bear dies of old age, which determines Orson to attend Valentine to the presence of the King and Court.

Act 2d commences with the outside of the Palace and Gates of Orleans. A REGAL BANQUET Orson introduced—he is astonished at every thing he sees; after a variety of tricks, and no small degree of terror to the King's nephew, he is left to regale at pleasure, but on missing Valentine he rushes out in pursuit of him; Valentine (on his way to the pavillion of Agramonte) is attacked and nearly assassinated by Henry and Hawfrey, who are jealous of the princess Eglantine's attachment for him. The distress of Orson on this occasion is very great, as he feels the most lively interest for Valentine through all his pursuits.

The Encampment and Assault of the GREEN KNIGHT. On one side a tree, on which several knights in armor are seen hanging; a shield marked with magical characters is suspended, & guarded by a Saracen priest. The Green Knight enters, preceded by Saracen warriors; he offers lady Florimonda his hand, which she rejects, and shews him these words on a scarf, "Florimonda will wed the Knight that frees her from Agramont." Eglantine exists disguised

in Valentine's armor, and offers to fight the Green Knight, after which a battle ensues with swords: she is overcome, and he is about putting her to death, when Valentine arrives: a furious combat with broad swords, takes place, and a second with battle-axes & shields. On the commencement of the third, Orson enters, pulls down the magic shield, which has hitherto resisted human power; opposes it to the Green Knight; every weapon he makes use of against it, breaks and drops from his hands! He is then overcome; becomes the prisoner of his conqueror, and is led off in triumph.

The Castle of the Giant FERRAGUS. Valentine and Orson enter. The fiends who guard the gates rush out, but are vanquished by the magic power of a Ring given by the enchanter Paololet.

The MAGIC CHAMBER. In the centre, on a pillary a Golden Head, and on one side of it stands the enormous Giant FERRAGUS, leaning on a massy club, which he raises on the entrance of Valentine and Orson; Paololet (the enchanter) waves his wand; the club changes to a heavy chain, encircling the arms of the Giant. Orson grasps him in his arms and overthrows him. Paololet touches the Golden Oracle, which speaks, and the Golden Head disappears. The Marriage of Orson to Florimonda is proposed to Paololet, of which he approves.

Scene Last. A grand procession, Attended by Banquets, Guards, Trophies, &c. Triumphant Cars, which bear Valentine, Eglantine, Orson and Florimonda. The piece concludes with an appropriate FINALE & CHORUS.
