## FEDERAL GAZETTE.

MONDAY, JUNE 15.

To the attention of our correspondent at Richmond, under date of the 13th June, we are indebted for the information of General WILKINSON'S ARRIVAL AT HAMPTON; which place it is supposed he immediately left for Richmond. Every mail from the latter place will now be important. In addition to the above, our correspondent furnishes the following proceedings, in anticipation: This attempt to subpoena the president U. S. is not without precedent.

## Trial of Col. Burr.

Wednesday, June 10.

Mr. Hay rose and said, in respect to the motion of yesterday, which was made by Col. Burr and his counsel, for issuing a subpoena to the president of the United States, with a clause requiring him to produce certain papers; he had determined to oppose both the motion and the affidavit on which it was grounded. "I wish not (said Mr. Hay) to take up the time of the court, or to occasion any unnecessary delay. It is my sincere desire that the accused may have every legal advantage which his case requires; but I shall ever oppose any measure which does not appear to me grounded on equity or precedent. We have been wasting our time and contending about nothing; for I can assure the gentlemen that even were the papers brought here, they will never pass from your hands to theirs. Before we can get to the main question of this motion, a variety of inferior points must first be determined. These will necessarily occupy a vast deal of time. I am therefore extremely unwilling to enter into any discussion respecting the production of these papers from the president, for I am well satisfied from my knowledge of the government, that every evidence which may any ways be necessary will be produced. I have already written to the president respecting them, and rely upon an answer in the course of five days at furthest. By that time Gen. Wilkinson will certainly be here. There is no one who knows Gen. Wilkinson, that entertains the smallest doubt of his not obeying the orders of government, and I pledge myself so soon as he arrives, that there will be no delay.

Mr. Luther Martin observed in reply, that as to the time of the court and the delay mentioned by Mr. Hay, that this entirely depended upon the counsel for the United States, and not on the counsel of Burr, who should throw no obstacles in the way to occasion that delay. Mr. Wickham remarked, that although Mr. Hay had written to the president for those papers, yet still he might be disappointed. He therefore wished the subpoena should issue.

Mr. Luther Martin then addressed the court, to shew the propriety of issuing the process, but was interrupted by Mr. Hay. When first interrupted, Mr. Martin spoke about the impropriety of the interruption, and affirmed he should not be interrupted so frequently. Mr. Hay—"The motion now laid by Mr. Burr, is, that a subpoena should be awarded by this court, for the purpose of bringing here the president, on the production of certain papers. I contend, sir, that this motion is premature; that Mr. Burr, in the situation in which he now stands, is not authorized to demand the interposition of this court. What is the situation of Mr. Burr? He is here on his recognition—he is not here on his trial. No person has a right to demand subpoenas to be issued by a court, unless he is brought on

trial, and a true bill has been previously found. There is no act of congress, no clause in the constitution, no principle of common law, that authorises such a request. When the awful crisis in this business shall come, that the grand jury has found a true bill against Mr. Burr, either for treason or a misdemeanor, then the present motion may be proper, but not until then. The only sentiment in the constitution which any way seems to embrace the present question, is the eighth amendment. But this clause only relates to the period or stage of prosecution, when a petty jury has been impanelled. In the preliminary stages, or, to use a more fashionable phrase, in the incipient stages of the prosecution, no such right is admitted. This clause also allows the accused the right of counsel, that is, when he is brought on trial. Has not Mr. Burr, although he is not yet on his trial, the benefit not only of the first counsel the state of Virginia can afford, but the aid of a gentleman of great abilities from the state of Maryland. But I should be glad to be informed what would be done with those papers, if they were here. They cannot answer it—We alone can tell, because we know the purport of them. Will the counsel for Col. Burr, therefore, anticipate their contents? Will they say they contain matter of importance to the accused, when they are ignorant as to the circumstances to which they relate? At this time, therefore, there is not the most distant occasion for the production of such a paper before the court. Mr. Burr is premature in his motion. Before I conclude, however, I do affirm that my only and real object is to save time, and not to waste the time of this court by useless and unnecessary discussions. I cannot help also remarking, that this application was never made until yesterday—that it should have been deferred until now, when with equal propriety it could have been made the first day of the court as at present."

Mr. Wickham—"I will not inquire whether our object be to gain or save time—Such an inquiry would be real loss of time. Mr. Martin gave notice of the motion yesterday, and the reason why it was not made until now, must appear obvious from the correspondence that has passed between Mr. Randolph and Mr. Smith. The application was made with a view of accommodating witnesses who are attending on the part of the United States. We are asked when our right to these subpoenas did attach. Is not this done every day by a committing magistrate? Has not every magistrate the power of issuing such subpoenas by an application from the accused or his counsel, while his commitment is pending? But we are told there is nothing in the usage of the court that sanctions this. In the trial of Smith and Ogden at New-York, subpoenas were taken out for Mr. Madison and Mr. Dearborn. We are also asked, why we did not make this motion sooner? Colonel Burr's privileges are also noticed, and the number of counsel employed to assist him is remarked. But I should beg leave to observe, is not an additional number also employed on the part of the prosecution. Besides the attorney general, there are two of the most brilliant members of the bar of this state. But what has this to do with the question, whether a subpoena should issue or not. It has been the practice in England ever since the reign of king John, the era, when the rights of Englishmen were secured by the Magna Charta."

Extract of a letter from Capt. Clark, of the ship Walker, to his owner in New-York, dated Halifax, May 30.

"On the 28th, when in lat. 49, 6, long. 27, 10, I was taken by a French privateer, from Bayonne, who plundered the ship of about 50 packages of the most valuable goods, long-boat, &c. They took out my mate, 5 seamen, and 3 passengers, and put on board a prize-master and 8 men, and ordered the ship for a port in France or Spain. On the 1st of May I rose on the captors, took charge of the vessel, and made the best of my way for N. York. The same day I found myself in the midst of a British fleet of merchantmen, under convoy of the Crocodile, who put a prize-master and 15 men on board me, and ordered me to Halifax, where we arrived on the 28th inst. What is the pretence for capture, or what they intend to do with her, God only knows."
