

the age of concession is past. Of this we are aware. What then is left us? When we are too obstinate to concede, too dull to be convinced, they must then be constrained.

So confident were Generals Tarleton and his coadjutors of being returned for Liverpool Thursday, that the Chairs were brought in the morning for the purpose of chairing them, and they had ordered a sumptuous dinner to be provided in the evening; when independent freemen of the name of Green unexpectedly came forward and nominated Mr. Roscoe. The name of Green is remembered his unpleasant race with General Tarleton in America, when the English hero first rode for a distance of nearly two miles. The friends of Mr. Roscoe are determined to keep the poll open the legal time, fifteen days.

May 14.

The Levant fleet, under convoy of the Juno, has arrived in port. Intelligence has been received by it relative to the state of the combined fleet in the Mediterranean. The combined fleet in Cadiz consists of a thirteen sail of the line, of which five are French, and eight are Spanish. There are moreover, three or four ships of the line in ordinary, two upon the stocks, and several frigates and frigates refitting. In Carthage there are three sail of the line, three frigates, and two sloops, all ready for sea. The ships are all manned, and with their sails bent. The French admiral made a late attempt to escape; but perceiving that Lord Collingwood was on his station, and was resolved to remain there, he deemed it prudent to return into the harbor, and wait the co-operation of the Spanish and Rochefort squadrons. Besides the above squadrons in Cadiz and Carthage, there are three two-deckers, two frigates, and three sail of the line, in the harbor of Tenion; and three frigates, two sloops, and many gun-boats, in that of Venice. At Naples there are two sloops and a frigate. The vessels in the Italian ports are but badly manned, but the French endeavor to remedy this defect, by pressing the crews of every vessel which they chance to meet.

When the Juno, left the Cadiz fleet, admiral Sir John Duckworth and Sir Sidney Smith were hourly expected off Cadiz; and orders had been received by Lord Collingwood to instruct these officers to proceed immediately on their way home. Mr. Arbuthnot, his family, and suite, are coming home in the Amphion.

The Barbary powers had learned the first success of admiral Duckworth forcing the passage of the Dardanelles, and the intelligence had produced a very sensible effect upon them.

May 15.

Twelve o'clock—Last night Hamburg and Dutch papers to the 12th instant, were received. They contain the 72d Bulletin of the French army. They do not state any thing as to any engagement; but in the last bulletin Bonaparte speaks in such terms of the king of Sweden as induces a belief that France and Sweden will soon be on the best terms.

The rumor of an existing negotiation for a general peace was revived on Tuesday with increased confidence, upon the alleged authority of private letters, received by the *l'Espresso* Hamburg mail. The overtures were stated as having been made by Napoleon to the emperor Alexander, who was of opinion that they should be submitted to the allies. The inactivity of the armies in Poland has been also urged, as evidence of a subsisting negotiation. But it is confidently asserted on the other hand, that all hopes of amicable arrangement had vanished before the emperor of Russia left his capital. As in the latter case a battle must have been fought before this time, these contradictory reports have greatly increased the public anxiety for the arrival of foreign papers.

Hamburg papers to the 6th, and Dutch to the 13th, arrived in town last night. Although their details are interesting, yet they are totally silent on the main object of our anxiety—the great battle which was anticipated to be on the eve of taking place. Bonaparte seems at this moment more willing to emulate the policy of Machiavel, than the prowess of Alexander; and to place greater reliance on flattery than force.

If report is at all to be credited, Austria has lately shown some symptoms of being influenced by French intrigue. Mr. Stewart, whose arrival from the court of Petersburg we mentioned in our yesterday's paper, is said to be charged with proposals submitted by Bonaparte to the allies, and backed by rather a haughty recommendation on the part of his Austrian majesty. It is even said that the last mentioned power has gone so far as to declare Turkey its ally! We hope these rumors are unfounded. But when we consider the jealousy of Russian interference in the affairs of Turkey, always manifested by the former head of the Germanic body, we must confess we find more ground for dread than hope.

The late change in our councils cannot be supposed to impress a favorable opinion of our steadiness, any more than an increase of vigor in our measures. It is not, therefore, a matter either for complaint or admiration, if foreign states consult only what they may deem their own interests, unconnected with a reference to our situation. When England herself seems to have lost all sense of what is due to her, we must not expect other nations to be careful of her interests.

The French have taken possession of the islands of Usedom and Walin, in pursuance of the armistice which the king of Sweden has not ratified.

Mr. Shaw, the messenger, arrived late last night with dispatches. The three Hamburg mails which were due, also arrived. They have not brought any intelligence of importance from Poland; and the Paris papers to the 8th instant, that hostilities will recommence as soon as the weather will permit. All hopes of peace had vanished, the Paris papers admitting that the overtures of Bonaparte had been peremptorily rejected.

The senate, in an address to Bonaparte, in answer to his message relative to the concession, talk of his detaching 200,000 men from his army, is stronger by 130,000 men than it was at the commencement of the war, and hold out the prospect of his surprising, turning and surrounding the Russian army, and compelling them to receive from him either death or law. Probably, however, his imperial majesty is not quite so sanguine in his expectation of surprising, turning and surrounding the Russians, as his august senate. Twice has he attempted this system of turning, and failed. The senate, of course, echo the praises which Bonaparte bestows upon himself for his moderation. "Our politics (say they) are fixed. We offered peace to England before she brought forward the fourth coalition; this peace we offer her still. We are ready to conclude peace with Russia upon the same conditions which its negotiator had signed, and which the intrigues and influence of England compelled the emperor Alexander to reject. We are ready to restore tranquility to the eight millions of people whom we have conquered, and the capital of Prussia to its sovereign."

His Swedish majesty has refused to ratify the extraordinary armistice concluded by Gen. Essen, whom he has removed from his command. We may expect, therefore, to find the next bulletin from the grand army retracting all that has been said in praise of his Swedish majesty, and recurring to the old system of scurrility and invective. A reinforcement of 15,000 Swedes has been ordered to be embarked for Stralsund, and the Swedes will have in Pomerania an army of not less than 10,000 men. Bonaparte will thus be obliged to keep a strong force to watch them, and his grand army of course be weaker than it would have been had the armistice been ratified. The Vienna Court Gazette, in an article under the head of Tenedos, states that the Russians have made an unsuccessful attempt to take the Castle of Tenedos. The Dardanelles is strictly blockaded by the English and Russians. The Turks in the interior are defeated in every encounter with the Russians. We shall soon see whether they will be more successful under Mahomet's standard, which had been conveyed from the Mosque of St. Sophia, with extraordinary solemnity and pomp, to the camp near Adrianople.

According to the movements of the French armies, Bonaparte seems to fear that the emperor of Austria will declare against him. The latter has recommended to the Hungarian diet to embody the levy en masse; and the archduke Charles has formed a plan of military conscription, exactly with the French model.

Lieut. general Carlton, and major-general Gascoyne, are appointed members of parliament for Liverpool. Alderman, Piers, Shaw, Curtis and Combs, are elected for the city of London.

PINKENING, April 30.

The emperor has divided the grand army into three principal corps, which he has reviewed in succession. The enemy has also divided its force into three principal corps. One is to be commanded by the emperor of Russia in person, with general Bennigsen under him. Another will be led on by the king of Prussia, assisted by generals Ruchel, Blucher and Leskev. The third will be commanded by the grand duke Constantine and general Tolstoy. The principal advanced guards remain under the orders of prince Bagration. It appears to be almost certain, that every prospect of peace has vanished, the courts of Russia and Prussia having rejected the proposals made by the emperor Napoleon.

COPENHAGEN, May 5.

According to letters from Konigsberg, the prince of Benevento is said to have had a conference with the emperor of Russia, not far from Braunsberg; the day and place is not mentioned.

Extract of a letter from a very respectable mercantile house in London, received by a house in this place, dated May 2, 1807.

"With respect to grain, we give it as our opinion and in strong and positive terms, that neither flour nor grain can be wanted here, unless the ensuing harvest should fail. France is much overstocked in the southern provinces, and they are glad to find an opening for it to any part of the world, a great deal is coming to this country, on which account prices are reduced considerably. You may rely upon what is here stated."

Price of Flour at Liverpool, 14th May. Superfine Flour 48s. a 44s. dull. The supply of wheat and flour have given way.

Forty eighth article of the Spanish ordinance, published by the new Tribunal of Admiralty, of which the Prince of Peace is the chief.

Foreign vessels shall contribute in the ports of Spain, and adjacent islands, the same sums that shall be exacted of Spanish vessels in the ports of the powers to which they belong, in any manner whatever; and this same reciprocity shall be observed

henceforward, so that the contribution shall augment or decline in the same degree as the powers to whom the vessel belongs, shall respectively raise or diminish that on Spanish vessels.

"It may be important to communicate that the present British ministry are determined not to make any concessions to the United States, and that in the papers opposed to the ministry, this conduct is very severely reprehended."

By the Communication to-day, from our Correspondent at Richmond, we are informed that little business was done in court on Monday. An account of that little is given. It appears that the court adjourned at an early hour, owing to the engagement of general Wilkinson with the grand jury. The examination of the general, and of the voluminous documents of which he is the bearer, will necessarily require much time. We hope the good people concerned will exercise their discriminating powers, in limiting the number of the volumes to be published for the right understanding of this business. If all the papers with which general W. is freighted must be laid before the public, then indeed we have a task in no small degree alarming. Through the long month of August many a press will groan in detailing the account of this awful conspiracy!

### Trial of Col. Burr

TAKEN FOR THE FEDERAL GAZETTE MONDAY JUNE 22.

The court was opened at eleven. Mr. E. Randolph. Call James Knox, and Chandler Lindsay.

With submission to the court we shall now proceed with our motion. Mr. M. Rea, said that he understood that the motion was not to be proceeded with, in the event of general Wilkinson's not being able to attend. Mr. Burr, observed it was the concession which col. Burr had made on Saturday which now gave rise to the present proposal of postponement. He therefore would be of opinion, that the consent which was given ought to be retracted.

Mr. Burr, said it must be manifest that had he not made the concession on Saturday, the present investigation would now have been gone into; but still he had no objections for a present postponement, if the counsel for the prosecution shall name a day. Mr. Rea, replied that was impossible as probably gen. Wilkinson might be engaged much longer than was supposed with the grand jury.

The Court gave their opinion as the present motion partook partly of a rule to show cause, and for an adjournment to issue, he thought the testimony might be gone into at present, and that the witnesses might be cross examined afterwards in the presence of gen. Wilkinson.

A message was sent to the grand jury to know if gen. Wilkinson's attendance could be dispensed with. An answer was returned that he probably would be occupied with the grand jury all day. The Court, then proposed in place of the examination being made to-day that it should be made to-morrow; and in the mean time counsel for the prosecution might consult with gen. Wilkinson, on what interrogatories should be put to the witnesses, and which interrogatories might be afterwards put whether general Wilkinson was present or not.

After some discussion on both sides it was agreed to postpone the motion until Tuesday, and the court adjourned about twelve.

Ennity of Britain!

From the 4th of March last, to the 14th April following, (40 days) there were imported into the port of Liverpool alone, 14,298 bags of cotton, and 1829 barrels of flour—and the demand continued brisk. Notwithstanding the close connection with Russia and Sweden, the demand for naval stores, tar and turpentine, was very great in England—several of the British vessels had sailed for the United States for supplies.
