Trial of Col. Burr

FRIDAY, June 26. The court was opened about half past The grand jury entered at half past ten.

After their names were called over, Mr. John Randolph delivered the following indictments to the clerk, who read as follows: The U. S. John Smith (Oa.) For High Comfort Tyler, Isr. Smith (N. Y.) True bill.

The Chief Justice, in the name of the court, thanked the grand jury for their attention, attendance and perseverance in this long and laborious investigation.

They were then discharged; and the court adjourned on the motion of Mr. Hay, until twelve.

The court met at twelve.

Mr. Botts rose to make a motion that some prison or place of confinement of a more suitable nature than the one now in use should be prepared for col. Burr. That the prison in Richmond was a disgrace to humanity. That unfortunately all the prisons in the state are of this description. That the place of confinement at present allotted to col. Burr is only a room of about 10 feet square, in which a man and his wife are at present lodged. That the apartment moreover is overrun with vermin, and the only music which is heard is the rattling of chains. Mr. Botts quoted an act which empowers the court to commit to the state jail, or any other jail, which they may think proper. He said, he understood that either from a natural apprehension, or an artificial apprehension, a company of military were stati-oned round the jail. That such a multitude would be sufficient to prevent his escape in any place of confinement, or even at his own lodgings. Mr. Botts asked, would it not be a disgrace to the annals of this country, if it were recorded at this particular time, when the whole country was exasperated, that one in col. Burr's situation, should

suffer through pestilence and disease.

Mr. Wickham begged leave to add two words. Col. Burr's sufferings have been and are intolerable. I have seen this gentleman in many situations. I have seen him in one of the most elevated situations of this country. I have seen him dragged to this city in a most inhuman manner; and I have seen him in the place in which he is at present placed; in all which situations he has preserved the same firmness.

He, then concluded by praying the court to alter the situation of his confinement.

Mr. Martin spoke at some length in support eitheir of admitting col. Burr to bail,

or removing him to some other place of con-finement. He said, he himself and several others were ready to join him, in admitting col. Burr to bail in one hundred thousand dollars. That he had full confidence in col. Burr's honor and integrity; and if he only pledged his word to the court that he would attend, that he would place full reliance upon his promise.

The Court expressed their reluctance to interfere, but thought the executive might. Mr. Edmund Randolph. The Court are of opinoin that they have the power under certain circumstances, of appointing proper places of confinement to accused persons. The constitution and the amendments to the constitution, authorise the Court to do this. who are associated with me, the situation of the jail in which col. Burr is confined .- I have been there once, and I confess from the ingredients that excited my feelings, I feel a repugnance to visit that place again.

The Court after consideration, agreed that the Marshal, if he pleased, might procure a safe from for the keeping of colonel Burr.

The Marshal accordingly went, attended by Mr. Latrobe, the surveyor of the public buildings, to inspect the rooms lately occupied by Col Burr, to give their opinon whe ther or not they would answer the purpose.

Mr. Hay rose and made some observations to the court as to the mode of proceeding in

Col. Burr's trial.
Colonel Burr informed the court, that he had received a copy of the indictment and that, he would plead not guilty.

Some discussion took place whether or not

"Guilty or not Guilty."

Colonel Burr. I acknowledge myself to be the person named in that indictment, to which I plead not guilty, and accordingly throw myself upon my country for trial.

HRALTH-OFFICE.

PHILADELAHIA, June 27, 1807. WHEREAS several coasting vessels, with foreign goods on board, have since the commencement of quarantine, proceeded to the city without stopping at the Lazarento for examination, thereby subjecting themselves to a fine of five hundred dollars for a violation of the health law; but several of the captains having declared their ignorance of such restrictions : Therefore Resolved, That the following section of the health law be published in the newspapers, and in haudbills, to be distributed to the pilots, for the information of those it may concern.

authority aforesaid, That all ships or vessels, as well vessels of war as merchant vessels, coming from any port or place within the United States, and bound to the port of Philadelohia, between the first day of June and the first day of October in every year, and having on board any goods or merchandize, the growth or produce of any foreign place or country, or any person or persons bedding or cloathing from any foreign port or place, shall come to anchor opposite the Lazaretto, and shall be examined by the Lazaretto physician and quarantine master; and if the captain or master of any such ship or vessel shall produce such sat sfactory proof as the board of health shall in that case direct to be required, that the said goods or merchan-dize shall have been landed in the United States more than thirty days, and are free from damage, and that the said vessel, badding, cloathing and persons are free from the infection of any dangerous contagious disease, the small pox and meazles excepted, then and in that case the said physician and quarantine master shall give to the captain or master of such ship or vessel a certificate of the facts, permitting such ship or vessel to proceed to the city, which certice to the said captain or master shall present at the health office in Philadelphia, within twenty-four hours after his arrival and safely mooring there; and if he should neglect to do so, being thereof legally convicted under this act, he shall be sentenced to pay a fine of two hundred dollars, to be recovered and appropriated as is hereinafter directed and provided; and if the said captain or master shall fail to produce such satisfactory proof as aforesaid, of the wholesome state of the said. vessel, goods, merchandize, bedding, clot);ing and persons, the said vessel, goods, merchandize, bedding, clothing and persons shall be detained at the Lazaretto, and small be proceeded with in the same manner; and subject to the same orders and regulations as are herein before provided and directed in the case of vessels coming directly from a foreign port or place; and if the captain or master of any ship or vessel, coming from any port or place within the United States, and bound to the port of Philadelphia, having on board any goods or merchandize, bedding, clothing or persons as af resaid, shall Below-ship Clyde, from Amsterdam, refuse or neglect to come to anchor opposite the lazaretto, and shall pass the same with intent to proceed to the city withour examination by, and certificate obtained from, the said physician and quarantine master as aforesaid, he shall on conviction, forfeit and pay the sum of five hundred dollars, to be reand Calcutta; Cuba, Littlefield, Matanzies; Young Factor, Gualt, London; General Eaton, Jewett, Havana; Parnasso, Basset Charleston,; Fanny, Terry, London; brig Mary, Wood, New-Bedierd; schr, bright agreeable to this sci. brig Mary, Wood, New-Bediere; schr. as the board of health, agreeably to this set,
