**From a late London Paper.**  
**MEETING AT FREEMASONS' HALL.**  
On Tuesday the 14th inst. a very numerous and highly respectable meeting of noblemen and gentlemen was held at this place, for the purpose of concerting means for improving the opportunity presented by the abolition of the slave trade, for promoting innocent commerce and civilization in Africa. The very late hour to which the debate in the house of Lords, of the preceding evening had been protracted, and an election at the Charter House, deprived the meeting of several noblemen, who would otherwise have been present. Yet we distinguished in the room, besides his royal highness the duke of Gloucester, who presided, the following noblemen and gentlemen:—  
Earl Euston, Earl Spencer, bishop of London, bishop of Durham, bishop of Bath, and Wells, bishop of Saint David's; lord Valentia, lord Teignmouth, lord Headly; the chancellor of the exchequer; right honorable J. C. Villiers; sir John Newport, M. P.; sir V. Gibbs, M. P.; sir P. Francis, K. B.; lieutenant-governor M. P.; col. Barry; Dean of Carlisle; revd. Dr. Jowett, revd. Dr. Macleod; Samuel Whitebread, esq. M. P.; Thomas Bernard esq.; H. Banks, esq. M. P.; Grenville Sharp, esq. William Sharp esq. Wm. Smith esq. Charles Grant esq. M. P. William Wilberforce, esq. M. P. Robert Thornton, esq. M. P. Henry Thornton, esq. M. P. Thomas Babbington, esq. M. P. William Roscoe, esq. M. P.; Thomas Clarkson, esq. John Thornton esq.; Stephen Lushington esq. M. P. Pascoe Grenfell, esq. M. His royal highness opened the business of the meeting in an elegant and appropriate speech; wherein, after congratulating the meeting on that glorious and happy event the abolition of the slave trade, and advertising in terms of warm eulogy to the merits of Mr. Wilberforce, he pointed out the advantageous opportunity which that event would soon offer for the introduction of commerce of a beneficial kind; of agriculture and the other arts of social life, into that immense and hitherto unfortunate continent. He considered the attempt so to repair the injuries which Africa had sustained by its intercourse with Europe, as a natural and necessary prosecution of the same just and humane principles which had led to the abolition of the slave trade, and as an effort worthy the exertions of a great and generous people. He also adverted to the advantages which would be likely to arise to the commerce and manufactures of this country, from such liberal endeavors, if successful.

His royal highness having received from Mr. Wilberforce a series of resolutions, explaining the objects of the meetings, and establishing a society for the purpose of carrying those objects into effect, concluded, by submitting those resolutions to the consideration of the noblemen and gentlemen present.

Earl Spencer, in a neat and concise speech, signified his cordial concurrence in the resolutions which had been proposed, and in the general objects of the meeting. His lordship expressed his great satisfaction at seeing so large and highly respectable an assembly convened for so noble a purpose, and was peculiarly glad to hear of that opportunity of professing publicly his approbation of their beneficent design, and his joy at the abolition of the slave trade, as he had been prevented by a long and severe indisposition from contributing his aid in the success of the bill which had lately passed into a law; a measure of which his lordship spoke in glowing terms, as honorable in the highest degree to the national character.

Mr. Wilberforce very briefly explained the general objects of the proposed institution, on the value and importance of which it was needless for him to expatiate, as they were sufficiently understood and felt by every gentleman who heard him. The detail of practical measures which it might be proper to pursue, in order to excite and assist the spirit of commercial, agricultural and other improvements in different parts of Africa, must obviously be fitter to be discussed and settled in a committee, which one of the resolutions went to constitute, than at so large a general meeting; but he trusted it would be found very practicable to give, by making or encouraging attempts at improvement, on a small scale, upon different parts of the coast, examples of successful industry and moral and intellectual improvement, which might soon be widely imitated and extended, to the unspeakable future happiness of Africa, and the great benefit of our own manufacturing and commercial interests. When, by the private endeavors of the society, conducted as they ought to be, with the utmost caution and prudence, some happy beginnings were effected, it might be reasonably hoped, that assistance would be given by government and the parliament, towards extending, upon a larger scale, the same beneficent system.

The Resolutions, were then put, and unanimously carried; after which, the several Resolutions of thanks to Messrs. Wilberforce, Granville Sharpe, and Clarkson, were moved by different gentlemen, and also unanimously agreed to, with great and general applause.

On the last Resolution, for thanking the Duke of Gloucester, which was moved by Mr. Wilberforce, loud and long continued applause manifested the strong sense which the company entertained of His Royal Highness's zealous support of the cause of Africa, in Parliament, and of the honor he did the Institution, in consenting to accept the office of Patron. His Royal Highness, in a feeling and graceful manner, expressed his sense of the honour done to him by the approbation of so respectable an assembly; and declared, that it should be his constant endeavour to promote, to the utmost of his power, the noble and interesting objects of the Institution.
