June 30. Last night arrived, the ship Rebecca, capt. Parkinson, 27 days from Cayenne. Left no American vessels. June 16, lat. 27, 25, long. 65, 4, spoke the Generous Friend, of and from Philadelphia, 8 days out, bound to Jamaica, all well; two days before, was boarded by a Spanish privateer, and treated politely. June 22, in lat. 23, 47, long. 70, 24, spoke the ship Thomas, of & for N. Y. from Cape de Verde, 27 days out, all well.

Nassau, (N. P.) June 4. Arrived on Monday, the private vessel of war Mayflower, Geo. Johnson, commander, with the Spanish brigantine Maria, her prize. The Maria was one of a fleet of 27 Spanish merchant vessels proceeding along the coast of Cuba, under convoy of several gun-boats, and having put into the port of Barne, on that coast, she was cut out by the Mayflower, and brought to this port for adjudication. She has on board about 450 boxes of sugar.

Schr. Flora, Carr, of Bristol, (R. I.) touched here on Tuesday, in 85 days from the coast of Africa, with eighty-six slaves, bound to Charleston, and sailed the same day. Left there the brig Jane, of Liverpool, to sail in 8 or 4 weeks for Barbados, and brig Three Sisters, of Warren (R. I.) H. M. S. Driver, captain Love, arrived yesterday from a cruise.

The schr. Friends, captain Sweeting, sailed on Tuesday, for Philadelphia.

La Diligente brig, of 16 guns, captain Hall, arrived at Kingston on the 14th ult. from a cruise, with the Spanish brig San Pedro, lately the Alexandrine of this port, of 14 guns, from Carthagea bound to Trinidad laden with cotton, cocoa and Peruvian bark, captured by her off the former port on the 10th instant.

The Deconverte captured by an English brig loaded with coffee, from Port de Paix, bound to New-York, which she sent to Jamaica.

Resolved, That we believe it the wish of our government, and the interest of our country, to cultivate peace and friendship with all nations, if it can be effected without surrendering our sovereignty.

Resolved, That the tyrannical conduct of the British nation on the ocean has justly rendered her odious among all civilized powers.

Resolved, That we view the late savage and dastardly outrage committed by the Leopard, British ship of war on the U. States frigate Chesapeake, with due indignation.

Resolved, That we conceive it our bounden duty at this awful crisis, to express our sentiments, that our government may not be at a loss to find out the true friends to America that are willing to embark in her cause, to convince that haughty nation that the spirit of '76 yet reigns in their hearts.

Resolved, That, as a volunteer corps, we do tender our services to the president of the United States, pledging ourselves never to disgrace the American flag when unfurled; and that we will hold ourselves in readiness, at a moment's warning, to obey the call of honor, in defence of our national dignity.

Resolved, That the resolutions entered into at a meeting of the citizens of Norfolk, command our respect.

Resolved, That the proceedings of this meeting be transmitted by the chairman to the president of the United States, and that they be published in the newspapers of this town.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman in Providence, dated June 26.

"The ship Hazard has arrived here, in 34 days from Amsterdam. The letters and papers are not yet brought ashore. The supercargo has come up, and informs, that it was reported in Amsterdam that the French and Russians had had a general engagement from the last of April to the 10th of May, in which the latter were victorious, and the former were retreating."

COL. BURR. We have not received a communication from our Richmond Correspondent for several days: The following account of proceedings, subsequent to any he has furnished, is from the "Enquirer" of the 27th:

"The court then adjourned until 12 o'clock. When it had assembled, Mr. Bott's requested the court to remove Mr. Burr from the public jail to some comfortable and convenient place of confinement. The grounds of this motion were to be found in the following affidavits made by some

of Mr. Burr's counsel and laid before the court.

We, who are counsel in the defence of col. Burr, at the suite of the United States beg leave to represent to the court, that in pursuance of our duty to him, we have visited him in his confinement in the city jail; that we could not avoid remarking the danger, which will most probably result to his health, from the situation, inconveniences, and circumstances attending the place of his confinement; but we cannot forbear to declare our conviction, that we ourselves, cannot freely and fully perform what we have undertaken for his defence, if he remains in the jail, aforesaid, deprived, as he is, of a room to himself; it being scarcely possible for us to consult with him upon the various necessary occasions which must occur; from all which we believe, that he will be deprived of that assistance from counsel, which is given him by the constitution of the United States; unless he be removed.

The counsel for the prosecution were perfectly silent on the motion.

After a long and desultory argument by Mr. Burr's counsel, the court determined that the prisoner should be removed to his former lodgings near the capitol, provided they could be made sufficiently strong for his safe keeping.

Mr. La Trobe, surveyor of the public buildings of the United States, was requested to inspect them; and upon his report the court passed the following order:

Whereupon it is ordered, that the marshal of this district, do cause the front room of the house now occupied by Luther Martin, esq. which room has been, and is used as a dining room, to be prepared for the reception and safe keeping of colonel Burr, by securing the shutters of the windows of the said room by bars, the door by a strong bar or padlock. And that he employ a guard of seven men to be placed on the floor of the adjoining unfinished house, and on the same story with the before described front room and also at the door opening into the said front room; and upon the marshal's reporting to the court that the said room has been so fitted up and the guard employed, that then the said marshal be directed, and he is hereby directed, to remove to the said room the body of the said Aaron Burr from the public jail, there to be by him safely kept.

A long and desultory conversation ensued upon the time when the process was to be made returnable; or in other words, when the trial in chief was to commence. Some contended that 30 days would be sufficient to serve the Venire in Wood county; others that 35 would be necessary. The general opinion seemed to be in favor of the 1st Monday in August. The Chief Justice would have preferred the shortest possible day in consideration of the expense and inconvenience which would result from the delay; unless indeed more important circumstances should have recommended a longer period; such as the necessity and advantage of obtaining witnesses from distant parts of the country.

The court, however, rose without assigning any particular period: The decision lays over until this day. The orders were to be made out for summoning a Venire, and the time of the return to be left blank. These blanks are to be filled up this day (Saturday.)

Mr. Hiy informed the court that the clerk was doubtful whether the parties last indicted should be brought before the court, by a capias or a summons. He should now move for a capias. The chief justice replied there could be no difficulty on the subject.

The trial of Colonel Burr is postponed till the third of August.

From the National Intelligencer of July 1. We understand that immediately on receiving information of the issue of the outrage offered to the Chesapeake, the secretary ordered captain Decatur to take the command of her, and prepare her without delay for service; and likewise ordered an inquiry to be instituted into the conduct of commodore James Barron, on the occasion. The court of inquiry is composed of commodore Preble, and captains Hull, & Chauncey, and is to convene on board the Chesapeake.

The following is a copy of the letter addressed by the officers of the wardroom of the Chesapeake, to the secretary of the navy.

Late U. S. ship Chesapeake, Hampton Roads, June 23, 1807.

Sir, The undersigned, officers of the late U. States ship Chesapeake, feeling deeply sensible of the disgrace which must be attached to the late (in their opinion) premature surrender of the United States ship Chesapeake of 40 guns, to the English ship of war Leopard of 50 guns, without their previous knowledge or consent, and desirous of proving to their country and the world, that it was the wish of all the undersigned, to have rendered themselves worthy of the flag under which they had the honor to serve, by a determined resistance to an unjust demand, do request the honorable the secretary of the navy to order a court of inquiry into their conduct. At the same time they are compelled by imperious duty, by the honor of their flag, by the honor of their country; men, and by all that is dear to themselves, to request that an order may be issued for the arrest of commodore James Barron on the charges herewith exhibited which the undersigned pledge themselves to prove true, viz,

1st. On the probability of an engagement, for neglecting to clear his ship for action. 2ndly. For not doing his utmost to take or destroy a vessel which we conceive it his duty to have done.

The Hon. ROBERT SMITH, Secretary of the U. S. Navy, Washington.

The Secretary of War was expected to arrive in this city last night, and the Secretary of the Treasury is expected to-day. After their arrival, a full consultation will, no doubt, be had with regard to the measures called for by the crisis, the delay in taking which has probably arisen from their absence.

In the Gazette of Tuesday last, we gave (from the "Herald") the letter which was received from the impressed Americans now on board the Bellona. The following is from the Norfolk Ledger (an evening paper) of the same date.

"Letters have been received by the Collector of this port, from the following men on board the ship Bellona, captain Douglas, stating that they are American citizens—John Holdridge, William Roberts, John Barnes, Jeremiah Holmes, John Harris, John James, James Farrell, James Craig, Emory Griffin, Stephen Pindell, Conrad Smith, John Henry, John Hinton, Peter White, George Beams, Charles Washington, William Moore, born in Accomack county, has a family there, and where all his relations reside, William Ware, a native of the county of Baltimore, Scott's Fields, Maryland, served his time in Elliott's Mills, 26 years old, 5 feet 3 inches high, brown complexion, dark hair and eyes, a scar on his forehead, and another on his thumb; said to be one of the men taken from the Chesapeake.

Descriptions taken from the Register of Seamen, in the Collector's Office, Norfolk: John Hartman, born in Baltimore, Maryland, 4 feet 7 inches high, 14 years old.

John Holdridge, born in Germantown, Pennsylvania, 28 years old, 5 feet 7 3/4 inches high.

James Craig, born in Cumberland county, Pennsylvania, 21 years old, 5 feet 10 1/2 inches, fresh complexion.

There are 4 men of this name described in the Register—one born in Norfolk, 5 feet 3 3/4 inches high, 32 years old, fresh complexion—one born in New-York, 4 feet 10 inches high, fair complexion, 15 years old—one born in Nantuxmond county, Virginia, 18 years old, 5 feet 3 1/2 inches high, brown complexion."
