Negroes, and secures them in Baltimore jail,

shall receive, if taken in the city, or within

twenty miles thereof, fifty dollars, if a greater

distance within the state, one hundred dollars,

and if out of the state, the above reward, or

in proportion for either of them.

All Masters of vessels and all others, are fore-

warned against harboring, or carrying off said

Negroes at their peril.

TWO ROYAL TIGERS, MALE & FEMALE

THESE curious Animals, lately imported
from Sumat, in Asia, are the first that ever
reached any part of this continent. On their
arrival they were not a year old. They are
nine feet long, and three feet in height. Their
crowns designate them as royal, and peculiar
to Asia. When full grown, their bulk is tre-
mendous, much superior in size to a lion, and
of prodigious strength. Their color is a bright
yellow, beautifully marked with long stripes of
black, which run in the same direction as their
ribs, with others across their thighs.—The
Tigers in Asia are the scourge of the country;
insidious, blood-thirsty and malevolent, pre-
ferring the human flesh for their sustenance
to that of wild beasts. They lurk among the
bushes, and bound on their prey: if they suc-
ceed, and are undisturbed, they plunge their
heads into the bodies of the animals, up to their
eyes, as if it were to satiate themselves with
blood, before they tear them to pieces. It
attacks the lion or elephant, and is truly said
to be the most powerful animal in the world.
