The variation of the compass, on which the location of lands in this country and elsewhere so much depend, is described to be an arch of the horizon, contained between the meridian of the place, and the magnetic meridian, and is either east or west, or is the number of degrees, &c. the point of the needle stands from the true north or south points of the horizon reckoned to the east or west. This being the case, the magnetic needle apparently for many years has been progressing toward the west until lately, an arrest toward that point it is likely hath taken place, and probably at this time is returning toward the east. Having in a slight degree fluctuated, since I had any idea of variation (from about the year 1775) that its westerly progress hath annually in a gradual manner been diminishing, until the year 1794 or 5, at which period the needle apparently was stationary—but it is probable that in a very short time thereafter it may have taken a retrograde movement in a very slow way. For the purpose of satisfying my curiosity as to the space of its retrogradation, I was induced to make some observations in November, 1802, and others at this time, by which I discovered, that an easterly movement of the needle had taken place at the rate of about three minutes and twenty-six seconds annually; this apportionment may not be exactly true, as it is likely the needle may recede in a greater ratio annually the nearer it approaches the true meridian of the place of observation. After which its movement may diminish in the same ratio, until it again returns westward, but how far it will traverse, time and observations will be the only means to discover.

Knowing myself not competent to make those nice astronomical calculations which case requires, it would therefore be pleasing to engage those more capable and better qualified to illustrate a matter so interesting to the public. A SURVEYOR.

Any person apprehending the said negro and securing him in jail so that I get him again, shall receive if taken within ten miles from home Ten dollars, if forty miles Thirty Dollars, and if a greater distance the above reward and all reasonable expenses if brought home.
