13. The American Fair—May peace and happiness be the reward of their transcendent virtues, and a life of bliss succeed their dissolution.

14. The officers of the wardroom of the late U. S. ship Chesapeake—May they shortly have an opportunity of displaying their courage, and retaliate the infamous outrage committed by the British ship of war Leopard.

15. May the sons of Columbia always bear in mind the principles of '76, and follow the genuine precepts of their ancestors.

16. The Commerce of the United States—free and unlimited.

17. Our National Rights—LIBERTY or DEATH!

WILMINGTON, (Del.) July 4.

At a numerous meeting of the citizens of Wilmington, in the state of Delaware, pursuant to public notice, John Dickinson, Esq., was appointed Chairman, and Outerbridge Morley, Esq. Secretary.

The President's Proclamation and the communication of the committee at Norfolk relative to the inhuman violence committed on the frigate Chesapeake, were then read and duly considered; whereupon Dr. James Tilton, Samuel White, Esq. John Warner, Edward Roche, Esq. Jacob Broom, Esquire, Ebenezer A. Smith, and James Lea, were appointed a committee to form resolutions, expressive of the sense of this meeting relative to so daring an outrage, who, after a short deliberation, reported the following, which were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we view with the strongest sentiments of indignation and abhorrence the late unprovoked, lawless and ferocious attack made by the British ship of war Leopard upon the frigate Chesapeake, and the daring insult offered thereby to the flag, the government and the people of the United States.

Resolved, That we highly approve of, and are ready to second with our warmest efforts, the prompt, the spirited and patriotic conduct of our fellow-citizens at Norfolk, Portsmouth and Hampton.

Resolved, That the murder of our fellow-citizen, John Pierce, the late acquittal and promotion of Captain Whitby, the perpetrator of it, added to this recent and unprovoked act of violence committed on the Chesapeake frigate, officers and crew, evince a disposition on the part of the British hostile to the peace, prosperity and independence of this country.

Resolved, That we will maintain the strict observance of the proclamation of the president of the United States, by every means in our power.

Resolved, That we will support with our lives and fortunes such other measures as the government may adopt to obtain retribution for the flagrant violation of our national rights and the murder of our fellow-citizens.

Resolved, That the governor of this state be requested to warn the militia, and to excite them, by such means as he shall think best, to be ready, upon any case of emergency for the defence of our shores, and such towns as might otherwise be subject to depredation and plunder from the lawless marauders.

Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed, whose duty it shall be to hold communication with like committees, in the different counties and towns of this State and of other States; and also to advise with such other influential characters, throughout the United States, as they may think proper to consult, relative to the objects of this meeting.

Resolved, That a copy of these proceedings be transmitted to the President of the United States and the Governor of this state; and that they be published in the news-papers.

Extract of a letter from the highest authority, dated WASHINGTON, July 7.

"A letter from captain Decatur is just received by express, dated Norfolk, July 4,

stating that on the preceding evening the four British ships appeared in Hampton Roads,

and by their movements manifested a determination to take the frigate Chesapeake.

All hands were accordingly at quarters all that night.—

The next morning at day-break, three tenders were observed sounding the Channel.

On the 4th, in the morning early, they brought to a vessel going from Hampton to Norfolk, and by her sent a letter, from commodore Douglas, declaring, that if they did not rescind their resolution, he would cut off all communication with Norfolk by water, so as to allow no vessel whatever to go to or from that place, and on the 4th, a small vessel proceeding from Hampton to Norfolk was fired at and turned back. They have sent several insolent messages to Norfolk; among others, that if they did withhold from them all supplies, they would take them by force."

Something further.—The report of this morning says the New York Evening Post of Friday last turns out to be too true that the Revenue Cutter of the United States, having the Vice-President on board, with his daughter, was hailed and ordered to bring to, and a gun fired for that purpose by one of the British squadron off the Cape of Virginia. Finding she kept on, they manœuvred a launch and chased her, but a breeze springing up, the cutter was soon out of reach, on which the launch gave up the chase after firing a volley of musquetry.

Salem, June 26.—Arrived, barque Active, Richardson, 45 days from Malaga.

From the Merchant's Coffee-House Books.

July 7.

Arrived, brig Rising Sun, Burr, 16 days from Point-Petre, (Guad.)—sugar and coffee—Biscoe and Partridge. Left brig—

M'Cranor, of Portland; Active, of Gloucester; ship Mary, of Norfolk; Washington, of New-York. July 8, spoke ship Horizon, of Kennebeck, 11 days from Alexandria, for Cork. The Hutton, of Newbern, sailed in co. Saw her boarded by an English privateer in sight of St. Kitts, and made a prize of her. Came into the Capes on Saturday morning; saw nothing of any of the English ships within the Capes. On Friday about 15 leagues from the Capes, saw 2 large ships standing to the northward and eastward, supposed them ships of war.

Capt B. reports that a Capt. Wing, of Charleston, who arrived at Guadalupe from Barbados, reported that a packet had arrived there from England, which brought an account that war had been declared by England against the U. States, and also an English brig brought into Guadalupe, direct from England in 17 days, gave the same account by her papers.
