RICHMOND, July 18. We are authorised to state, that in consequence of information received that the Brish squadron had departed from Hampton Roads, and had taken a station off our Capes, the Executive have suspended the march to Hampton of the 500 militia ordered out from Gen. White's brigade. They have been permirted to return to their respective homes, with orders to hold themselves in readiness

to take the field at a moment's warning. The two companies of infantry, and the troop of cavalry already stationed at Hampton, will be continued. We are moreover authorised to state, that in consequence of the above information, and of positive assurances from General Mathews, that the militia already called into service from his brigade, aided by the cavalry from Petersburg and Richmond, will be amply sufficient to repel any attack that can be made by any force which can be spared from the British squadron; the infantry from Petersburg and this place will be immediately discharged; major A mbler, under whose command they march ed to Norfolk, is authorised to charter one or more vessels for the use of such of them as may think proper to avail themsselves of that mode of conveyance. All the other forces now under the command of General Mathews at Morfolk, will be continued until more substantial evidence is obtained of a change of disposition on the part of the British squa dron. Those forces, together with the troops stationed at Hampton, will occasionally be relieved at short periods by other detachments of militia.

Examples of Patriotism.

The portion of militia from Hanover and Henrico, which was called out in part of the detachment of 500 men from Gen. White's brigade, intended to march to Hampton, consisting almost entirely of volunteers, assembled and organized with remarkable promp titude. A considerable part arrived at this place on Tuesday last, and the balance on the next day. On Thursday the necessity of rheir proceeding to the place of their desti nation, at present, having ceased, they were permitted to return home until farther or ders, and directed to receive two day's rations, and pay for five days. They were also presented with the thanks of the executive. for their patriotic zeal. We are informed the intelligence of a postponement of their march was received by them with great regret; every man displayed the utmost anxiety to distinguish himself in the service of his country.

In consequence of the absence of so many of the inhabitants of Richmond, on the expedition to Norfolk (by which it was sup posed the safety of this place was diminish ed) a number of public-spirited citizens have formed themselves into an association for the defence of the city, and raised a large and most respectable troop of cavalry, of which Edward Carrington is captain, Wm. Dabney, 1st lieutenant, Thomas Taylor, 2d lieutenant, and Jekyll Jones, cornet. voluntarily subject themselves to severe mi litary duty, in which they exhibit very considerable skill, and every night patrole the streets. The executive, by virtue of a power vested in them by law, had previously ap pointed a small guard of sixteen men to serve the purpose of a patrole; but have since discontinued it, relying on the vigilance of the patriotic association of cavalry, who do indeed deserve well of their country.
