100 Dollars Reward.

On the 7th inst. (the day on which they were printed) there was stolen from the printing room of the Hager's-Town Bank, four half sheets, or impressions of printed notes, each half sheet containing four notes, viz. one of \$100, one of \$50, one of \$5, and one post note, all blank; and as none struck from the same plate have been issued by the bank, except eight \$100 notes, from No. 1 to No. 8, inclusive, will be issued until the stolen notes are recovered, the counterfeits may readily be detected. The \$100 and \$5 notes are No. C; all of the same denomination which have been issued, are No. A and B, of course no \$100 or \$5 notes No. C, are in circulation, but counterfeits, or any \$100, except eight. The stolen notes are badly executed, being printed by a person who did not understand the business; they have a smutty appearance, and two of the \$100 notes, which I have seen and which were detected in Baltimore, are very badly filled up and signed.
The above reward will be given for apprehending and prosecuting to conviction, the person who has or may forge the filling up and signatures of any of the said stolen notes, or who has or may pass any of them with a knowledge of the forgery.
