## Latest from Europe.

To the many favors for which we are indebted to our attentive friend and correspondent at New-York, he has just added one, which demands much more than our grateful thanks.

"New-York, July 27.

"This morning arrived the ship Susan, Howard, 40 days from Bordeaux. The ships Erin, Stevenson, and Ranger, Sherbourn, of Baltimore, were there; the latter to sail 25th June for Tonningen. Enclosed you have the latest papers.

"Also arrived, ship Jane, Bragdon, 45 days from Cadiz. No news by her.

The editor of the Federal Gazette has received (via N. York) Bordeaux papers to the 12th June inclusive, containing Paris dates of the sixth, and intelligence from the armies down to the 30th May.

We hasten to translate the 77th bulletin, which presents the official account of the fall of Dantzic. No general battle had taken place; nor do these papers contain intelligence of any other important movements.

The Ann and Elizabeth, of Norfolk, was at Bordeaux, to sail for Baltimore 25th June.

## POSTSCRIPT.

## SEVENTY-SEVENTH BULLETIN OF THE GRAND ARMY.

Frankenstein, 29th May, 1807.

Dantzic has capitulated. That fine place is in our power. Eight hundred pieces of artillery, magazines of all kinds, more than 600,000 quintals of grain, cloth, groceries, &c.; all kinds of provisions for the army, and in fine, a place of the first strength to support our left, as Thoren supports our centre and Prager our right—those are the advantages obtained during the winter, and which have signalled the leisure hours of the grand army—these are the first and finest fruits of the victory of Eylau.

The rigor of the season, the snow which has often covered our trenches, and the frost which has added new difficulties, have been no obstacles to our labors. Marshal Lefevre has surmounted every thing: He has animated with the same spirit Saxons, Poles and Badens. The difficulties which the artillery had to encounter were considerable. One hundred mouths of fire, from five to six hundred thousand pounds of powder, and an immense quantity of balls, have been shot from Stettin and different parts of Silesia.

We would also have had to overcome difficulties of transport, but the Vistula offered a prompt and easy conveyance. The cannon of the guard carried the boats under the fort of Graudentz with their usual skill, and bravery.

Gen. Chasseloup, gen. Kinschewer, col. Loostre, and indeed all the officers, have behaved in the most distinguished manner. The miners have displayed a surprising intrepidity. The corps of artillery, commanded by gen. Lariboisiere, has maintained its reputation. The second regiment of light infantry, the 12th, and the Parisian troops, have also distinguished themselves.

A detailed account of this siege will be carefully given. It will record a great number of fetes of bravery, worthy of being held up as examples to excite enthusiasm and admiration.

On the 19th the descent and the passage of the Moat were executed, at 7 o'clock in the evening. On the 21st general Lefevre had prepared every thing for the assault, when col. Lecoste, who had been sent into the place in the morning, made known, that general Kalkreuth offered to capitulate on the same conditions which had been formerly granted to the garrison of Mayence, which was agreed to.

Hekelsberg could have been carried by assault without much loss; but as the corps of the place were still complete, and a large ditch filled with water would have enabled the besieged to hold out for fifteen days, it was thought best to grant them an honorable capitulation.

On the 27th, the garrison marched out, with general Kalkreuth at its head. This strong garrison, which at first consisted of 20,000 men, is reduced to 9,000, and of this number 4,000 have deserted; there are even officers among the deserters. "We do not wish," say they, "to go to Siberia." We have obtained many thousand artillery horses, but they are in very bad order. General Rapp has been appointed governor of Dantzic.

The Russian lieutenant-general, Kameniski, after having been beaten on the 15th, retired behind the fortifications of Weischel-münde. He remained there, without daring to undertake any thing, and beheld the reduction of the place. When he saw that they were preparing red hot balls to destroy his vessels, he embarked, and withdrew.—He has returned to Pillau.

The fort of Weischelmund still held out; Marshal Lefevre summoned it on the 26th, and while they were adjusting the articles of capitulation, the garrison sallied out and surrendered. The commandant thus abandoned, saved himself by water. We are now therefore masters of the city and port of Dantzic. These events forebode a happy omen for the campaign. The emperor of Russia and the king of Prussia were at Heiligenbel; they must have known the reduction of Dantzic by the cessation of the fire, which can be heard at the former place.

The emperor (Napoleon) to testify his satisfaction at the conduct of the besiegers, has granted a compensation to each soldier. The siege of Graudentz commences under the command of Gen. Victor. Gen. Lazowski commands the infantry, and General Danthouart the artillery. Graudentz is strong on account of its great quantity of mines.

The cavalry of the army is beautiful; the

divisions of light cavalry, two divisions of cuirassiers and one of dragoons, were reviewed at Elbing, on the 26th, by the grand duke of Berg.

On the same day, his majesty went to Bischofswerder and Stralsburg, and reviewed the division of cuirassiers, commanded by Hauptmann, and the division of dragoons, commanded by Gen. Grouchy. His majesty was well pleased with their conduct, and the good state of their horses.

The ambassador of the Porte, Seid-Mohammed-Ben Vahid, was on the 28th, at 2 o'clock, P. M. introduced by M. the prince of Bentvento, to the emperor, to whom he presented his credentials: He remained an hour in his majesty's cabinet: he lodged in the Castle, and occupies the apartments of the grand duke of Berg, now absent at the review.

We are assured that the emperor said to the ambassador, that he and the Sultan Selim would henceforward be as inseparable as the right hand and the left.

The news of the success of Ismael and Wallachia has just been received: the Russians have been forced to raise the siege of Ismael, and to evacuate Wallachia.

Capitulation of Dantzic. After a long resistance, fifty-one days with open trenches, imperious circumstances rendered it necessary to capitulate for the surrender of Dantzic to the troops of his majesty the emperor of the French, king of Italy, and those of his allies, it has been agreed upon between his excellency M. the general of cavalry, Count de Kalkreuth, the general of the order of L'Étoile, and M. the general of division, Drouot, commander of the legion of honor and grand cross of the royal order of Bavaria, chief of the état-major-general of the 10th corps of the grand army, invested with full powers from his excellency M. the marshal of the empire, Lefevre, commander in chief of the said corps, as follows:

Art. 1. The garrison shall march out on the 27th instant, at 9 o'clock in the morning, with their arms and baggage, colors flying, drums beating, match lighted. Two pieces of artillery, and their waggons drawn by six horses each.

2. The remainder of the artillery horses shall be surrendered to the French.

3. The arms of all kinds, except those belonging to the officers and soldiers, shall be given up to officers of the artillery to be appointed for the purpose.

4. The garrison shall be conducted to the advanced posts of the army of his majesty the king of Prussia, at Pillau, passing by Neuhong.

5. The garrison engages not to serve against the French army nor its allies, for one year, reckoning from the date of the present capitulation. M. the general Count de Kalkreuth, his highness the prince de Scherbachow, and the officers, engage, upon their word of honor, to observe and cause to be observed the present article.

6. On the 26th, at noon, Hakelsberg, the gates of Oliva, Jacob and Newgarten, shall be given up to the troops of his majesty the emperor of the French, king of Italy, and those of his allies.

7. The officers, non commissioned officers and soldiers, at present prisoners of war in Dantzic, whether belonging to the troops of his majesty the emperor or those of his allies, shall be exchanged.

8. To prevent all confusion, the troops of his majesty the emperor and those of his allies, shall not enter Dantzic until after the departure of the Prussians and Russians.—There shall, nevertheless, be a guard fixed at the different posts.

9. As the means of transportation are insufficient to carry off all the baggage, a boat shall be granted to the garrison, which shall go direct to Pillau. The embarkation shall be made under the superintendence of a French officer.

10. Officers shall be appointed on both sides to give up and receive articles belonging to the two armies, including charts, plans, &c.

11. The magazines, waggons, and whatever belongs to the king, shall be given up to the French; and a commissary shall be appointed to deliver them to the person who may be authorized by his excellency M. the marshal Lefevre to receive them.

12. The Prussian officers who were prisoners on parole, and who had returned to their families in Dantzic before the siege took place, may remain there to wait the orders of his highness the prince de Neufchâtel, major-general, but to enjoy this advantage, they shall produce a certificate from M. the governor, declaring that they have not assisted in the defence of the place.

13. The wives of all the officers and others, shall be at liberty to leave the town, and shall be furnished with a passport for that purpose.

14. The wounded and sick shall remain under the care of his excellency, marshal Lefevre; officers and surgeons shall be left, as well to take good care of them as to preserve good order and supply their wants. As soon as they recover, they shall be sent to the advanced posts of the Prussian army, and enjoy all the advantages of this capitulation.

15. An exact list of the officers, non-commissioned officers and soldiers, according to their respective regiment, shall be given to his excellency marshal Lefevre.—A strict control shall be kept over the soldiers who may remain in the hospital.

16. His excellency marshal Lefevre assures the inhabitants of Dantzic, that he will use every exertion to have their persons and property respected, and that the utmost order shall be maintained by the garrison.

17. In order to guarantee the observance of this capitulation, a superior officer shall be sent to the respective head-quarters. His excellency the governor has appointed M. the major Lestocq; and his excellency marshal Lefevre has appointed the adjutant-commandant Guichard.

18. The present capitulation shall go in force, if, by the 26th instant, at noon, the garrison shall not have received any succors. And it is understood, that in the intermediate time, the garrison of Dantzic cannot make any attack upon the besiegers, supposing that the latter should fight outside.

Done at Dantzic, the 10th May, 1807.
