Charlotte, Lowder, of Trenton, stranded & hauled up on ground at Tonning, having damaged part of her cargo; Raleigh, Hannoner, for Philadelphia, ready for sea, and supposed to have sailed the same day with the Temperance; bri. Fame, Hill, for N. York, in 20 days; schr. Washington, Harding, of Boston, uncertain, came in for information. Ship Marcus, of Salem, was lying at the entrance of the Eyder, waiting for the tide to go in, the wind being contrary. Captain B. spoke the ship Bristol packet. Burns, 11 days out from Philadelphia, for Oporto.

Captain B. informs, that on the 27th of July, in lat. 39, 40, N. long. 70, 30, he spoke the Swedish ship Ann and Hannah, from Port-au-Prince bound to New-York. The Ann and Hannah, was in a most distressed situation, on account of the sickness on board. The master informed us, that the former captain (Ellis) died in Port-au-Prince, and that they had lost eight of their crew since leaving that place; they had but one seaman left who could do duty. The chief officer was buried only a few hours before we spoke them.

We, however, saw five or six people on her decks, which we supposed were passengers or others who assisted in working the ship. They were much in want of vinegar, and we supplied them with a keg by throwing it overboard in such a direction that they might pick it up without lowering their boat.

CHARLESTON, July 24.
By the arrivals yesterday from Africa, the melancholy account of the loss of the ship Independence, Churchill, is confirmed. She was blown up at Loango; when her cargo, consisting of about 200 slaves, all the crew, except the captain, one mate and 2 seamen, who were on shore at the time, perished.

Capt. Churnsides from New-Orleans, passed in the river a schooner with slaves, supposed to be the Sally, Lark, from this port.

We learn from Cadiz, that vessels cleared for Gibraltar were detained in Algeiras, also, if in want of any of the consular certificates. The British were very kind in giving convey, whether they discharged cargoes or only stopped for supplies; having orders from their government to that effect. No vessels left Gibraltar as late as 19th April without convey.

NORFOLK, July 31.
The Richmond and Petersburg cavalry have received orders to return, and will march to-morrow morning.
The orders of the British Admiral Berkeley, relative to the search of the Chesapeake, is a document of importance.

We are of opinion from the date of these orders, and from some particular phraseology that they have originated with the admiral, without the knowledge of his government. The allusion to the seamen which the admiral says were paraded in the streets of Norfolk, were these belonging to the Halifax? It was on the 10th of March that the seamen were demanded thro' the British consul, the answer of the Mayor was given on the 12th; there were then only 80 days for the account to go from this to Halifax, from thence to England, and back to Halifax, a circumstance scarcely possible, without making any allowance for delays, that are unavoidable, and requisite for deliberation.

It is a little singular that the men that were taken from on board the Chesapeake belonged to a ship not named in the orders of Berkeley, they belonged to the *Madam*, and she is not named. The prospect of an accommodation is certainly increased if the government of England has not given the orders; at the same time it is to be hoped that under such an expectation, no relaxation of measures for war will take place, but on the contrary, that the interval of uncertainty will be filled by placing our country in the best possible condition for defence and offence, as the surest means of giving weight and consideration to our demands. The state of Europe is such, that without reference to the present affair, sound policy, nay perhaps the safety and independence of our country, invite us to union, and preparation for war—in peace prepare for war.

It is said that official dispatches have been received from our ministers in London, to the middle of May, which speak of the best founded expectations of a successful termination of the depending negotiations, and of the friendly dispositions of the British government. Notwithstanding this may be true as to such friendly dispositions and expectations, we should grieve to see the people lulled into a false state of security, that might be fatal to their happiness. We have to deal with a government who regards its naval commanders with peculiar favor, and may refuse to render us satisfaction suitable to the extent of injury. We repeat, therefore, let us be prepared for war!

Extract of a letter received at N. York, dated Richmond, July 25, 1807.

"The people of Richmond are truly patriotic; we are infinitely exceed you in enthusiasm; even the Ladies of this city are forming themselves into a volunteer corps; they were to meet to-day to elect their officers: the result of the meeting has not yet transpired. I am told they will parade on Monday, and when the troops arrive, they will meet them out of town and escort them in their uniform, a white dress, blue spencer turned up with white (the uniform of the state) blue shoes; the head dress I have not yet learned. Their appearance will be truly beautiful and grand. No longer let the northern states say our Virginia ladies are too puny to bear fatigue. I can assure you that they possess the true American spirit."
