

went on board the ship (she lying at anchor in the Roads) and was received with the greatest politeness. After informing capt. D. that the vessel and cargo was neutral property, he observed to me, that being found on board a French registered vessel it could be considered nothing else than French property, and that he should determine on nothing until he received advice from the Admiral (lying on the other side of the island). Some days after I again went on board, when he informed me he had come to no conclusion; that he then considered it lawfully a prize, but should he determine on returning the property he would make a signal.

Two days after, seeing the appointed signal flying, I sent my mate on board; but it proved to be a signal to another ship of war lying there: he however said, that the Admiral had left the affair discretionary with him, but that on supposition of my being the sufferer should he keep the property, he generously returned, not only the cargo, but the craft, together with four French prisoners; for which I take this method of returning him my sincere thanks.

In consequence of my going on board the British ship of war, I was arrested and vessel and cargo taken as security for my appearance at the trial; but some days after released by an order from the minister at Paris.

The schooner Polly and Sally, Keith, has arrived at Alexandria, from Baltimore.

The British ship Truro, Robinson, 64 days from Londonderry, with 300 passengers, has arrived at New-Castle.

The ship Joseph & Phoebe, M'Corkle, 70 days from Londonderry for Baltimore, to avoid the British in the Chesapeake, put into New-Castle, landed her passengers, and proceeded.

It is reported, that the governor of Lower Canada, has issued a proclamation, requiring all persons in that territory to take the oath of allegiance by a certain day, or to depart from the province.

The citizens of Beaufort (S. C.) have determined immediately to build one or more batteries for their protection; in consequence of which, a number of negroes have been drawn from the neighboring plantations, to commence the works.

At a meeting of the First Battalion of the Seventh Regiment of Maryland Militia, in Baltimore county, on Wednesday, the 19th instant, after performing the military evolutions of the day, the battalion resolved itself into a committee of the whole, of which Colonel Thomas Deye Cockey was unanimously chosen chairman, and Captain William Jamison appointed secretary.

Resolved, That major Isaac Dickson, major Joshua Frederick Cockey, captain Abraham Hicks Price, captain Stephen Wheeler, George Harryman, and John Bond, esqrs, be, and they are hereby appointed a committee to draught resolutions expressive of the sense of this meeting in the present crisis of national affairs.

The committee having retired for a few minutes, returned with the following resolutions, which were unanimously adopted:

Considering the numerous instances of insult offered to the United States, and oppression practised on their citizens by the authorised agents of the British government for many years past, and viewing with unqualified indignation, with unmixed abhorrence, the late dastardly, unmanly, savage conduct of the commander of the British ship Leopard towards the United States frigate Chesapeake—

Resolved unanimously, That we cordially approve of and proudly sympathise with the American Spirit displayed by our brethren of Norfolk, Portsmouth, Hampton, &c. on that sad occurrence.

Resolved unanimously, That at the risk of every thing most dear to freemen, we will support the constituted authorities of our insulted country, in whom we have the fullest confidence, in all their endeavors to obtain ample satisfaction for the monstrous outrage.

Resolved unanimously, That the foregoing resolutions be published in the newspapers of the city of Baltimore, and copies signed by the chairman and secretary be forthwith transmitted to the president of the United States, and the governor of this state.

Resolved unanimously, That the thanks of this meeting be presented to the chairman and secretary for their conduct on the present occasion.
