DISTRICT COURT, SEPT. TERM, 1867.
WHEAT. S. An information hath been filed in the district court of the United States for Maryland district, by John Stephen, Esq. attorney for the same, against a certain schooner or vessel called Virginia, or otherwise called General Massena, her tackle, furniture, apparel, and guns, praying a condemnation of the same, for having been imported and landed at Baltimore, without having been properly cleared, and to arm the said schooner, at the port of Baltimore, with intent that the said schooner or vessel should be employed in the service of a foreign state, to wit, in the service of the emperor of France and king of Italy, to commit hostilities upon the subjects and property of another foreign prince or state, to wit, upon the subjects and property of the king of United Kingdom of Great-Britain and Ireland; the said United States then being at peace with the said king of the United Kingdom of Great-Britain and Ireland, contrary to the form of the statute in such case made and provided: And whereas the Hon. James Houston, judge of said court, hath order'd and directed Monday, the fifth day of October next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon of the same day, for holding a court at the court-house, in the city of Baltimore, for the trial of the premises, agreeably to the prayer of the said attorney.
