The Americans, with all their noise and intemperance, had not, according to the last accounts, proceeded to this extremity. Refusal of supplies, and prohibition of intercourse with the shore, it appears, were the harshest measures recommended at the most violent of their meetings. We understand that orders have been expedited at Liverpool, and other ports, to prevent for the present, the departure of any foreigners from this country, notwithstanding ant passport that may have been granted for that purpose. It is possible that this measure has given rise to the rumor of the intended embargo.

We are still without any further accounts of the progress of our grand expedition, towards which public expectation is now so anxiously directed. The promptitude and vigour with which it has been sent on its important destination, are we belie e unexampled. For what remains to be done, we are to look to British valor and enterprize ; and in this view experience forbids us to apprehend any disappointment.
