MR. PECHIN.

I will thank you to give the following statement a place in your paper; the signature will designate the author, who will at all times hold himself amenable for its contents:—

On my return to this city, after an absence of about four weeks, I find some reports in circulation calculated to do me injury in my public capacity. Although it is believed, the propagators of those reports are not of the most respectable class of character, I have deemed it proper, on this occasion, to give them a flat contradiction. The real owners of the Gottenburg, (lately seized at the custom-house for a violation of the non-intercourse law,) who are as well known as Market street, or some of their coadjutors, have publicly asserted that the collector of the port has, in regard to that seizure, been guilty of gross partiality in the exertion of the duties of his office, by suffering other vessels to escape a heavier penalty than that which the Gottenburg, and have, since the sale of the cargo of that schooner, conducted themselves in a manner which no good citizen will ever countenance or justify.

I take this public manner of those charges, to give their names and their profits to the world; and should the persons be deemed worthy of notice, I pledge myself to prove that the charge against me is a villainous slander, and the reporters of the same a set of witful liars. To the honest, respectable citizen, and fair trader, (and the city of Baltimore contains a very great majority of such characters) I look up for support, they go; and opinion I shall be always proud to cultivate; towards the wanton violators of the laws, to the friends of perjury and smuggling, I shall never cast a glance, unless of pity or contempt; their idle vapouring or blistering bullyism will have no more effect on me than the passing breeze; they dare not openly do me a personal injury; and their impotence will always shield my character from harm. I beg leave also to state that in future, no opportunity shall ever be afforded to accuse me of partiality—a strict and rigid examination of all vessels in this trade shall be attended to by

The remains of the late George Salmon, Esquire, were, on the evening of Monday last, interred in the west burial ground of the First Presbyterian Church, in presence of a very numerous concourse of his friends and fellow-citizens.

Seldom is it that society, civil or religious, sustains so heavy a loss, or the domestic circle so painful a bereavement, as has occurred in the decease of this most estimable man. The abundance of his virtues renders it difficult to do justice to his character; but one who knew him well, who loved him living, and venerates his memory, cannot deny himself the tender gratification of bearing this brief and feeble testimony to his worth.

The felicities of this life, of which he had an ample share, instead of interfering with the claims of heaven, as they too often do, exalted his soul in pure and unaffected devotion to the Father of lights—the giver of every good and every perfect gift. His religion was of the modest and unobtrusive kind, although he never shrank from the acknowledgment of his obligations. His attainments in this respect were great, yet were they ever accompanied by an exemplary humility. His dependence was on the grace of God and the merits of his Redeemer.

The morality of Mr. Salmon was at once invigorated and characterized by his religion

The same singleness of heart—the same meekness of temper, were conspicuous in both. Walking humbly with his God, he did justly and loved mercy in his relations with mankind. Righteousness predominated in his pecuniary transactions, and yet left room for a generosity as diffusive as ever opened the heart or hand of man.

In his charities he was indefatigable. No importunities could weary him when want besought his relief. No company could detain him from the summons of poverty and helplessness. And here the distinguished feature of his mind was eminently visible: “His left hand knew not” the bounty which “his right hand” dispensed.

Never was there a more liberal or a more disinterested friend. So remote was he from affecting degrees of attachment, of which his heart was unconscious, that his looks almost invariably indicated more than his words expressed, and both his words and his looks came far, very far, short of his munificence and noble deeds.

His private life alone has here been adverted to. Civil and commercial society reposed many trusts in him, in the discharge of which there are multitudes more competent to appreciate his usefulness and assert his merits than the writer of this article. The ecclesiastical community, of which he was a distinguished and ornamental member, and in which he occupied one of the highest stations, will long have reason to deplore the privation of his faithful services, his zealous exertions, and his unremitting devotion to its interests.

Both in public and in private life—both in a social and in an individual capacity,—there was a firmness, a consistency, an activity, a perseverance, in him, which few possess. His resolutions were formed, and he was true to them. One of them, and that not the least important, was, to be continually intent on doing good; and rarely, indeed, could he in truth admit that lamentation of the Roman emperor, “I have lost a day.”

But it is enough. The virtuous and ingenious, whom the name of the excellent George Salmon may attract to the perusal of this sketch, will mingle their sorrows with its author's; but neither he nor they will sorrow as others do who have no hope.

“His witness is in Heaven, and his record is on high.”

ACCIDENTAL DEATH.

Died, last evening, Mr. George Maltby, a respected merchant of this city. This gentleman lost his life by the unexpected discharge of a pistol, in the hand of a friend.—The ball entered his head, and he immediately expired.
