The United States sch'r Revenge, bound to England, with dispatches from government, was spoken by Capt. Walker, of the ship Liberty, (arrived at N. York,) on the 18th ult. in lat. 48, 31, long. 22, 30, then out 18 days.

Capt. B. Armand, of the brig Hero, who arrived at Newburyport in 29 days from Surinam, informs, that news had reached that place of the fall of the Chesapeake; that they were apprehensive of war, in consequence markets were getting up—Flour worth 20 dollars, and those who had it would not sell—Molasses high, but getting down.

A letter from Calcutta, dated 25th Jan. says, "The board of trade has been much gratified by an official report lately made of the improved and extended cultivation of Hemp on this side India; immense crops are expected, of a quality equal or superior to any imported from Europe."

His Excellency the governor, has appointed the hon. George Jones a senator in the Congress of the United States, in the room of A. Baldwin deceased.

BURR'S TRIAL.
The Virginia Argus received to day (the Enquirer has no copy) gives the following latest proceedings.

Saturday, Sept. 12.
The argument on the motion for excluding the evidence was continued with great zeal and ability by Messrs. Randolph, Martin, and Wickham, whose speeches occupied all the time appropriated to the session of the court. The reporter regrets that the bad state of his health has prevented his giving, as he intended, a sketch of the substance of these discourses, as well as of those delivered on Friday by Messrs. McKee, Wirt and Randolph.

Monday, Sept. 14.
The Chief Justice delivered his opinion on the great question which had been so long debated. It was (as usual) in writing, and of very great length. We shall furnish it for the perusal of the readers of the Argus, as soon as we can get the manuscript. In the mean time we can only mention its result; which was, that every point of any consequence was decided in favour of A. Burr. Mr. Hay requested time to consider what steps could now be taken on the part of the United States; and the court adjourned until Tuesday, 10 o'clock.

Capture of Stralsund.
The brig Sally and Mary, Capt. Cobb, arrived here yesterday, from Copenhagen, which place she left the 29th July. Capt. C. brought no papers. Capt. C. informs, that a report had just been received of an attack upon Stralsund, and its capture by the French; that previous to the attack, the English had joined the Swedes; that the battle was very severe, and that the loss of the French was very great. Off the Naac Capt. C. saw 47 sail of British vessels, 27 of them ships of the line. Boston paper.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman in the county of St. Lawrence.

"On the subject of war, our people begin to be filled with strange alarms. One day, the British in Canada are receiving immense reinforcements—the next day, the Indians are forming rendezvous near Kingston, and have already collected to the number of three thousand warriors, only waiting a permission to be let loose upon us; and more than once it has been reported, that depredations have actually been committed on our shore of the river. These strange and improbable stories give rise to conduct equally so on the part of our good people. A few nights since, a good man and his family, in this neighborhood, were awakened from their dreams of danger by an uncommon noise in the chimney, which, from listening, they found to be human voices, apparently proceeding towards the house. Convinced that it could be nothing but Indians, they, in compliance with higher opinions and examples, sought safety by flying to the woods (accounted as I wish to see all others who favor the flying system) with no more clothes than they had on in bed. Their dog, not perfectly satisfied with the plan of operations thus hastily adopted, appeared to be inclined to reconnoitre. To prevent this, the good man seized him by the throat, and held him so long and so fast as to deprive the poor animal of life. In this situation the family remained until next day, when they were found by a neighbor, who had been some time in pursuit of them, and wishing to ascertain the damage his cattle had done the preceding night, in the corral."

A PROCLAMATION.

George the third, by the grace of God, of the united kingdom of Great-Britain and Ireland king, defender of the faith.

To all to whom these presents shall come or may in any wise concern, greeting.

WHEREAS the exportation of gun-powder, ammunition, arms and warlike stores of any description whatsoever from our province of Lower Canada to foreign parts may at this time prove injurious and prejudicial to the interests of our empire, inasmuch as such exportation will not only deprive us and our

subjects of a resource which in the course of future events may be required, but by re-exportation from foreign ports may become a source of supply to our enemies: We have therefore thought fit, by and with the advice of our executive council of our said province of Lower Canada, to issue this our royal Proclamation, and for the safety and benefit of our subjects, to order, and we do hereby order, that an embargo be forthwith laid upon all ships and vessels, wholly or partly laden or to be laden, in the ports of our said province of Lower Canada, or in any port thereof with gun-powder, ammunition, arms and warlike stores of any denomination or description whatsoever, or with either or any of the said articles to be exported to foreign ports. And we do hereby further entirely prohibit and forbid the exportation of gun-powder, ammunition, arms and warlike stores of every and any denomination or description whatsoever from our said province, and from every and any port thereof, to every and any other port, place and country whatsoever, save and except our united kingdom of Great-Britain and Ireland, and the rest of our dominions to which by law gun-powder, ammunition, arms and warlike stores may now be exported from our said province.

And it is our will and pleasure, and we do hereby order that the said embargo and prohibition do continue and remain from the date of these presents until the first day of January next ensuing, the date of this proclamation.

All which our loving subjects and all others concerned, are to take due notice, and govern themselves accordingly: we by the tenor of these presents, firmly enjoining and commanding them, and every of them and all and every of our officers and ministers whatsoever, to be in all things, and to the utmost of their power, aiding and assisting in the due execution of this our royal proclamation.

In testimony whereof we have caused these our letters to be made patent, and the great seal of our said province of Lower Canada, to be thereunto affixed. Witness the hon. Thomas Dunn, esq. president of our said province of Lower Canada, and administrator of the government of our said province, at our castle of St. Louis, in our city of Quebec, in our said province, the 13th day of August in the year of our Lord Christ, one thousand eight hundred and seven, and of our reign, the forty seventh.
