IX. 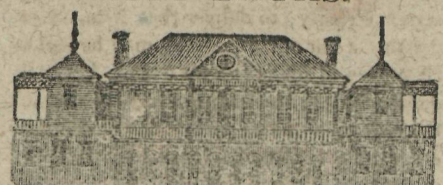

Although he has met with many losses, yet his property at fair valuation would still be nearly equal to his debts, but as his creditors have refused to take property in that way, he must submit—he must sacrifice the fruits of 10 years industry—and he still hopes it will be in his power some day, to settle every claim, for he shall always consider himself bound in honor, to pay every cent, if ever in his power.
