

ation from the detail of business. If we consider the eminent services, rendered at different times by the prince of Benevento, no honor in the power of Bonaparte to bestow will appear too great a reward. What ever post, however, the weary politician may be promoted to fill, he will, doubtless, continue to take an active part in the Imperial councils.

The Dutch papers mention, that the king of Holland has given orders that the governor of Curaçoa, and those concerned with him, shall be delivered up to the supreme tribunal, and prosecuted with all the rigor of the law.

Our expedition is said to have occasioned very little impression even in those places against which it is understood to be directed. A tendency to desertion is stated to prevail among the Hanoverian troops in the island of Rugen.

Admiral Collingwood is now generally understood to have proceeded with a squadron to the Dardanelles, with a view of acting towards the Russian fleet as circumstances may require. Every account both foreign and domestic, plainly indicate the advanced formation of that hostile confederacy to which his majesty's speech refers.

Copenhagen, August 11.
At the present moment, all is conjecture, confusion and anxiety. The island is now completely encircled by the British fleet, and until yesterday, even the ministry were ignorant of the motives of its appearance or designs.

STRALSUND.

Our last accounts from Stralsund are to the 2d August, at which time the siege had not been formally commenced, altho' several smart engagements had taken place between the outposts of the garrison, and the besieging army. The inhabitants had petitioned the king, to restore them to the blessings of peace; but his answer was, that he would rather perish in its ruins, than submit to ignominious terms. The siege is likely to be a work of time.

The coast of the German ocean, from the frontiers of Holland to the mouth of the Elbe, is to be occupied by Dutch troops.

Bonaparte, it seems, is at last to be canonized. A monument is erecting for him at Paris, 150 feet high. One hundred feet of this elevation is already complete, and the other fifty is to be built of the cannon taken in the late campaigns against Austria, Prussia, and Russia, and will be the most surprising and magnificent building of the sort in the world. The whole it is said is to be surmounted with a colossal figure of the tyrant himself.

ALTONA, August 14.

This afternoon an old established commercial house here received advice by an estafeta from Stralsund (via Rostock) that the French had been repulsed, with great loss, in their attempts to take that place by assault the beginning of this week.

Capt. Hardy, had sailed for the Chesapeake; and that a temporary embargo was to be laid the day after he came away, on account of the sailing of some transports, with troops on board, supposed for Quebec.

Capt. Warland also states, that the three men taken from the Chesapeake frigate with Ratford, had been tried and were found guilty of mutiny and desertion; but that the punishment of death had been mitigated, by being sentenced to receive 500 lashes each. This sentence was, however, fully remitted the day before he sailed.

* These men must be Ware, Strahan and Martin, who are, by some late depositions, declared to be American subjects; but who voluntarily entered the British navy.

COMMUNICATION.

To the people of Oldtown and Fall's Point.
As the Falls Turnpike Company are now opening the branch leading into Oldtown, which will probably be completed before the meeting of the legislature, it is not necessary to consider which of the several candidates now offering to represent us, are friendly to our participating in the trade that comes by the Hanover road, before we bestow our votes? It may be too late to ask questions, when the election is over; and we may, as heretofore, find an influence hostile to our interest, by which we have been cut off from all the back-country trade, except what comes by the York road.

At the last session, an application was made to the legislature by the Falls Turnpike Company, to grant a law for opening a direct road to the road leading to Cox's tavern. The extent of this new road would

be about nine miles. The company offered to open the road, to bridge it where necessary, to level and shape it—and, after doing these things, they pledged themselves to give it to the county, free of toll. This road, had it been granted, would have given to Oldtown and the Point a channel of communication with Hanover, nearer than the west end of the city has by the Reisterstown turnpike. Let us persevere and petition for our just rights and we must prevail.

He has been instrumental in bringing forward two large Charity schools, and is now a superintendent of both, he has frequently attended the legislature, to get good roads to our city, and has contributed much to the success those applications met with.

In short, during my long acquaintance with him, I have not known one person so often called upon to assist in useful and charitable designs and undertakings, which he always performed most cheerfully, without fee or reward. The citizens of Baltimore may therefore safely repose confidence in Jesse Hollingsworth, and give him their suffrages; and they may rest assured that the man who has been the father to the fatherless, the husband to the widow, the orphan's friend, and the ready servant of his city and country upon all occasions, will faithfully and honestly attend to their interests.
