

BY THIS DAY'S MAILS.

HALIFAX, September 12. This day arrived the Solus frigate, capt. Lord Fitzroy, 27 days from Cork, bringing dispatches for the admiral, general and governor. Two regiments are coming out here from England immediately; and the regiments now here are ordered for Quebec. This augurs something; but it may be done only to provide against that which is not expected, but may possibly occur.

In a petition presented to the commander in chief, from the three deserters, for a mitigation of punishment, Ware, states himself to have been born near Pipe creek, Fred. county, (Maryland); Strachan, at Queen's town, Queen-ann's county, in the same state; and Martin in the West Indies. That they had voluntarily and deliberately entered on board the Melampus. That they lament the crime of desertion, of which they had been guilty; and again offer their services on board any of his majesty's ships.

FOSTON, September 29. We last week had a report that Elsiner was attacked on the 13th of August; but Captain Foster, who arrived here on Sunday, said thence in the night of the 13th, to which time no attempt had been made against it, but it was expected every moment; and he departed in the night from apprehensions of being detained or exposed to some inconvenience. The Danes were much exasperated against the British, and would make the best resistance in their power. People had been collected at Copenhagen and Elsiner from all other parts of the island. When the British fleet first arrived off Elsiner, it was in a very defenceless state. Arrived, ship Lydia, Turner, Liverpool, salt.

Ship Massachusetts Buntin, from Malta, via Trapan, (Sicily) and 46 days since he passed Gibraltar, salt. At Palermo, (Sicily) July 9, Rebecca, Wilson, Alexandria. The ship Diana, Gardner, of Wisconsin, and Eliza, Jewit, New-York, sailed from Trapan 19th July for America. The Russians have blockaded the whole South coast of the Mediterranean, from Cape Spartel to the Dardanelles, and a Russian court of prizes has been established in Palermo, for the western part of the Mediterranean, and there were a great number of Russian privateers cruising at the time Capt. B. left Sicily, which was on the 21st July—it was generally reported that the Turkish fleet were out, and that the Russians had required assistance from the English, in which case there was a large force collected at Messina to proceed up the Levant. Spoke Aug. 3, in sight of Cape de Gar, the Diana, Gardner, of Wisconsin, 6th, off Malaga, schr. Betsy, 30 days from Leshorn, bound to Beverly. 8th, in the Gut of Gibraltar, was by night too by two English gun brigs, and examined, who reported they were sending Americans in daily for examination and condemnation. Lat. 41, long. 10, a schr. 19 days from New-York for Sicily.

NEW YORK, October 2. IMPORTANT REPORT.

The committee who were appointed to take into consideration the state of the W. India colonies, have reported to the British house of commons the small profit the planters receive on their sugar and rum; the low price of which they ascribe to the facility of intercourse between the hostile colonies and Europe, under the American flag by means of which, they say, not only the whole of their produce is carried to a market but at charges little exceeding those of peace; while the British planter is burdened with all the inconvenience, risk and expence, resulting from a state of war. In order to counterbalance, in some degree, the advantages enjoyed by the hostile colonies, and afford relief to the British export trade, the committee recommend a strict blockade of the ports of the enemy's settlements—also, "the enforcement of those restrictions on the trade between neutrals and the enemy's colonies, which were formerly maintained by Great-Britain." As it may be apprehended that from the adoption of such measures, difficulties might arise in that intercourse from which the West-Indies at present derive a considerable proportion of some of their supplies, the committee suggest, that supplies of lumber, flour and fish could be obtained from Canada and Nova-Scotia, and the deficiencies in other articles of salt provisions might be made up by supplies from Europe.

If the above report be adopted by the British government, need we say that it will have an alarming effect upon the commerce of the United States?

Sailed in co. from Copenhagen with ship Perseverance, of Ipswich, ship Grace of Boston, and brig Mary of Portland—parted from the two ships in Findland passage, the 14th August. Left, brig —, Smith, from Providence, and brig —, Haraden, of Salem, to sail in 4 days for St. Petersburg.

Since the name of Mr. Jesse Hollingsworth has been announced as a candidate for a seat in our next legislature, the tongue of slander has been busily employed in disseminating the most foul and base calumnies against him for his alleged conduct whilst our representative in the year 1787. His insidious opposers, in whispers will tell you, that he was then in favor of passing a law that would have been greatly oppressive on the poor who were not able to pay their debts. If the whole tenor of this gentleman's life did not sufficiently refute the charge, (by his unbounded philanthropy and universal attention to the poor of every description,) it could also be said, that when the law here alluded to was before the house of delegates, Jesse Hollingsworth was the man who, after getting the bill so modified that no poor man who had a family could on any account be oppressed by his unfeeling creditor, had the address and good management to defeat the bill altogether—as he did the pernicious attempt to get a large emission of paper-money pawned on the public, and for which every free man in the state ought even at this day to acknowledge his gratitude to him.

But some interested men in the neighborhood of the new docks, say that Jesse Hollingsworth will oppose the extension of Pratt-street across Ellicott's Hollingsworth's and Chesapeake docks. 'Tis granted, he may oppose so iniquitous an attempt to render more valuable property on the new docks, by destroying the first wharves and docks that were built in Baltimore, and but for which the new docks would most probably never have been thought of. Who is there that would be willing to have his house pulled down about his head, to render more airy and agreeable the palace of his neighbor? Or what man dare say to his neighbor, "The beauty and convenience of my neighborhood require that your house should be demolished; and if you don't agree to let me destroy it, I will petition the legislature for a law to enable me to do so without your consent?" when the only argument that can be adduced for this wanton violation of private right is, that by desiring a part, the remainder will be the more valuable—But to whom? Not to him who has no property left, but to him whose house yet remains. The good sense of the citizens of Baltimore will never suffer them to be duped by a few designing individuals.

They well know, that the substantial interest of the city can never be promoted by having twenty-five hundred feet of wharf landing, in the most central situation for trade, contracted to two hundred feet.—But, supposing that no man, however selfish, would expect the property was to be taken from him at some compensation,—let me ask, who are to pay the damage sustained? Is the merchant in Market-street (who now pays on a dray-load of goods from Chesapeake to his store twenty-five cents, when he has to pay fifty from the new docks) to pay any thing? Or the flour-dealer in Howard-street, (who is thus removed half a mile further from a landing,) is he to pay any thing? Can the great number of coopers afford to pay any thing, who now have their staves landed at the head of the basin, but who would have to haul them from the lower end of the city, in case Pratt-street was extended? No. Then if every person who lives west of South-street would be injured by the extension, they certainly would not submit to a general city tax for the purpose of raising a million of dollars, the whole benefit of which would go into the pockets of the holders of property on the wharves below Chesapeake. Supposing the impropriety of extending Pratt-street to be obvious to every reflecting mind, let me just ask the question, whether we have one citizen among us to whom the city of Baltimore is more indebted for its present state of opulence, than to Mr. Hollingsworth? Or have we a person who has oftener relieved the afflictions of the poor? What man ever applied to him in distress, that went away empty-handed? REBELLION IN IRELAND.

Letters of late dates from Ireland, represent that unfortunate country as experiencing all the horrors of a very general and deep laid revolt. It is described as being more formidable in its numbers and more regular in its plans, than any former association for the same object—viz. the emancipation of that country from the tyranny & injustice of the English government. [Rel.]

Extract of a letter from Rathbone, Hughes and Duncan, dated Liverpool, Aug. 25.

"Since our last advices we have had a continuance of unusually favorable weather for the harvest, and we learn from all parts of the kingdom that the crops are good in quality, abundant in quantity, the principal part already well housed, & a favorable prospect for that which is still on the ground. The demand for grain and flower has, in consequence, become wholly suspended; the holders are increasingly anxious to dispose of their stocks, and our last quotations must be considered nearly nominal.

"In ashes no alterations have taken place, and we confirm our last quotations.

"During the last week, the demand for cotton was very brisk, and considerable sales were effected at the following rates: Sea Island, very fine 2s 4 a 2-5 fine 2s 3 a 2-4 middling 2 r a 2s 2—ordinary 1s 11 a 2s 0-2 stained 1s 4 a 1-9.

New Orleans, fine 1s 6 1-2—middling to fair 1s 5 1-2.

Upland, fine 1s 5 1-2—fair 1s 4 1-2—ordinary to middling 1s 1s 1-2.

The English China fleet have sailed for England with only a small part of their cargoes; not having been able to settle the controversy which arose respecting the death of a Chinese.

Singular Coincidence.

An examination has been proceeding before the police of Paris, almost at the same moment that a similar inquiry was going on before the magistracy of this metropolis, on one and the same subject. A person of the name of Tessiere has been accused of blowing a certain powder into the eyes of those drawn as conscripts, which produced an inflammation, and consequently incapacitated them from serving in the army. An ointment was also found in his possession compounded for the same purpose. M. Tessiere's practice has been very extensive; 3 or 4000 conscripts have been thus inoculated with ophthalmia, one half of whom are in a fair way of losing their eye-sight entirely! [London paper.]
