LONDON, August 24. COMMERCIAL STATE OF THE WEST INDIES.

The report on the commercial state of the West India colonies, laid before our readers in the Star of Tuesday last, is of infinite importance. Amidst the suspicions which frequently arise in the breast of the public, that disquisitions in the houses of parliament are sometimes subject to receive the impressions of party, it must be observed, with great satisfaction, that reports, founded on the best evidence, are fair, full and impartial. We might on the present occasion call for some degree of credit, because our opinions, whenever we have hazarded them on that subject, have been perfectly in unison with the result of the West-India reports.

Two pamphlets have been published, which ought to have opened the eyes of the public. They contain positive and undeniable facts; and they have been answered only by vague declamation and metaphysical subtleties, which have something of the spirit, but nothing of the reason, or even the expediency of Crolic, in his Mare Liberum. A third pamphlet has made its appearance within these few days—"An inquiry into the state of the British West-Indies"—which also deserves great attention.

That the American system, which has been called a system of neutrality, is in fact the most detrimental hostility to the dearest interests of this country, is clearly proved by these pamphlets and by the report alluded to. Unless we revert to the maritime code of the war of 1766, which annihilated the French trade and navy, we shall continue to have the mortification of losing our commercial advantages, and seeing those of our enemies flourish and increase. That the Americans are only holding the cards for the French, is clearly proved by their stipulation to restore their vessels at the end of the war. This circumstance, among others, which showed the determination of Bonaparte to move heaven and earth to raise a powerful navy, we mentioned in 1803. In fact, without a serious resolution to maintain our rights at any risk, we may as well throw our commerce and independence into the lap of France.

Will America declare war against us? She might, indeed, invade and conquer Canada; but she would lose her trade. Reflection must arise in the minds of her sober citizens; they will see that every thing taken from us is an acquisition to France; and that France will as we have said before, be, in the end, the arbitress of the States, who will then be truly United, under her compressive authority. [Star.]

BOSTON, October 8. A letter from a well-informed American, residing in France, dated Paris, August 8, 1807, says, "You may place reliance on the fact, that Bonaparte will now turn his attention to the acquisition of a ships, commerce and colonies." All the dock yards in the empire are in great activity, particularly at Antwerp, where there is an immense collection of ship timber. I am told, he is determined to annul Mr. Jefferson's famous Louisiana purchase, and, you may depend, that that region, and the island of Cuba also, will be ceded by Spain to France; and that Spain will be indemnified in Portugal."

We place reliance on the authenticity of the above information; and we think the time not far distant when the real American will have much more to fear from French "Tories," than from British. [Continued.]

CHARLESTON, September 21. FATAL DUEL. Accounts have just been received from Beaufort, S. C. of a duel, which, from its fatal termination, must excite the keenest regrets of every heart of sensibility. A meeting took place on Monday the 14th of September between Mr. Arthur Smith, of Charleston, and Mr. Thomas Hutson, second son of Col. Thomas Hutson, of Prince William's Parish. The parties fired nearly at the same instant, and, dreadful to relate, each of them with effect, and both expired the same evening; Mr. Smith, aged 23 years, and Mr. Hutson 22. As much as we must at all times lament the fatal propensity of the youth of our country to appeal to this fallacious mode of repairing the injuries of offended honor, its revival at a moment when the aggressions of arrogant enemy call for the united effort of every heart of courage, and arm of strength to repel them, gives particular cause for regret. To see the blood of the youthful patriot shed in private contention, when it may so honorably flow in the service of his injured country, must excite the deepest sorrow. Mr. Hutson was spoken of as a youth of great promise. Mr. Smith is better known to us, and, if mildness of disposition, gentle and unassuming manners, manly sense, and a heart without guile, give title to applause, we may, without flattery or exaggeration say, that they were in an eminent de-
