

NEW-YORK, October 15.

The schr. Bull Eagle, Hull, has arrived at Boston, in a short passage from Malaga. She sailed from New-York on the 25th of July, with dispatches for the commodore of the American squadron, who was at Malaga. She made her passage to Gibraltar in 22 days, and has performed her voyage in about 70 days.

A letter from Liverpool, of Sept. 9, to a mercantile house in N. York, contains the following:

"Letters from London speak to a certainty of matters being settled between this country and America. Messrs. Munroe and Pinckney have had an audience with the cabinet council, and all is put straight again. The present industry is more favorable to America than the last."

A Dublin paper states that the Ross Island and Ennisorthy mines have for three years past afforded employment to upwards of ten thousand people; and adds that a new mine has lately been discovered on the estate of the earl of Derry, near the town of Teperary.

According to private letters received from Denmark it is confidently stated to be the general understanding, that Bonaparte made a most tempting proposition to the prince royal, in case he consented to cooperate in his views. This proposition is said to be the re-union of Sweden with Denmark and Norway, and this union to be accomplished with French troops, provided the prince regent would agree to close the sound against our trade, and place the Danish fleet at the disposition of France. That such a proposition may have been made is extremely probable; but no assertion is hazarded, nor is any reason stated to induce a belief that the prince regent had manifested a disposition to accede to it.

An order has been sent out to the squadron in the West-Indies, for the immediate capture of S. nta Cruz, St. Thomas, and other Danish colonies.

It affords us much satisfaction to find that the American government has not been so far influenced by the senseless clamour excited in that country, as to adopt the passions and violence of the mobs on the banks of the Chesapeake.

The letters from the fleet mention, that it was not the intention of lord Cathcart to make his final summons to the government of Copenhagen, until all his batteries were finished, and the place completely invested. This could not be effected until the 22d and the final summons would probably be made on the 23d.

DRESDEN, July 23.

It is reported here, on what is believed to be good authority, that the French marshal Ney will be appointed commander in chief of the whole Saxon army; which army will be entirely new organized.

From the N. Y. Evening Post.

The editor of the American Citizen, taking notice of the infamous attacks made by certain democratic papers, on chief justice Marshall, has expressed himself in a manner that does him infinite credit. After extracting a scandalous paragraph from a Baltimore paper, entitled the Whig, he goes on thus:

"Surely proof more ample than his patience, than his copious and elaborate opinions, is necessary to warrant this audacious assault on the chief justice of the supreme court of the United States. What has become of the order and decorum, the sober reflection and the sedate reasoning for which the United States are distinguished, when this violence and outrage can pass without notice."

After several very proper remarks, he concludes thus:

"If, however, I may be allowed to express my opinion, it is that the chief justice is not the real object of attack, but that in Baltimore, Philadelphia and New-York, a combination of a few men (and they are very few) exists to throw off the old and introduce a new order of things. I make no pretensions to the character of a prophet, but I beg the reader to bear the remark in mind. For the present I will only add that I stand on my old ground; and that I have an eye on some bad men of our party in the other states, who are co-operating with a few dupes in this city, and that in due time I will expose them. The people at large know but little of what is now doing, and perhaps it is well they do not."

To the Citizens of the third district of the Baltimore General Dispensary, comprehending Fell's-Point and other parts of the city to the east of Harford Run, also the adjoining precincts.

THE ADDRESS OF THE MANAGERS OF THE DISPENSARY.

Friends and fellow-Citizens,

It is now almost seven years since the institution which we conduct was established, during which time the district in which you reside has enjoyed an ample share of its benefits. Since the period at which the sick poor were placed under the care of three physicians, the objects of charity residing in your district have enjoyed the attention of one of them, to whom a salary of 300 dollars has been given, and an allowance made of 80 dollars per annum for medicines; and while the indigent sick were under the care of a greater number of physicians, those of your district had their full number allotted them. Nor have those who were able to come abroad been compelled to come to the dispensary to receive medical aid; but a place has always been provided at Fell's-Point, to which they might repair. And since the existence of the institution, the number of sick poor who have enjoyed its benefits, has been at least equal to that of any other district. These benefits are still continued to the objects of the charity residing among you, and an addition has this year been made to the salary of the physician; so that the stated expenses of this branch of the dispensary are now 480 dollars per annum.

Such being the care and attention which the managers have exercised towards your indigent sick, they think themselves entitled to call upon you for your contributions to this excellent charity; and they are sorry to say, that they have been, in general, far short of what your numbers and wealth gave them a just title to expect. When the institution was first established, your subscriptions were respectable; and two years since, they amounted to 200 dollars; but in no other year have they exceeded fifty. This is such a deficiency as they trust you will not justify; and they hope that they need not apply to you any stimulus to induce you to make greater exertions. These they are persuaded you will be ready to make; especially when you consider, that the extent of the benefit which they may be able to afford, must depend upon the funds with which they may be invested; and that a continued neglect on your part to contribute, may oblige them to recommend to the contributors to lessen the number of physicians, and to require the sick poor within the limits of the third district, who are able to go abroad, to come to the dispensary for medical aid.

Believing that the deficiency noticed above has been more the effect of accident

The contribution of five dollars per ann. will entitle the contributor, as long as he continues to make it, to recommend the indigent sick to the care of the dispensary, and to vote at the annual elections of managers and physicians.

TO A CANDID & GENEROUS PUBLIC.

With envy, esteem, and an habitual passion of deering every species of merit that presumes to move out of the common and ordinary track, at once combine to blast the private reputation and professional character of any individual, it becomes the duty of every honest man to endeavor to stem that torrent of oppression to which, sooner or later, if he once becomes the object of public notice, he may be himself exposed. I allude to Mr. Webster, "a stranger in a strange land," induced to come among you from that reputation of candor and honorable unness which have, and I hope ever will, characterize the American people. How fatally he has been deceived in his expectations, the public best can judge. They have witnessed the abusive hissings at the Theatre, fecid and intellectual as they were: they have witnessed the news papers, and, above all, they have witnessed the brilliant effusions of unprovoked malice, under the name of Criticisms, which adorn the elegant and classic pages of the "Observer." The rivals of his professional merit have the fault to commence the attack; but they soon were lost in their own insignificant Even newspaper squibs, and the hissings of the Theatre, were quickly absorbed in the consciousness of being unmerited and unprovoked. It remained only for the refined, delicate and feminine pen of the editor of the "Observer" again to drag him before the public tribunal; and again with all the distortions of malicious ingenuity to pourtray faults that have existence only in the fertility of her own imagination. Were the remarks of the editor of that celebrated work confined to fair and candid criticisms, I would never have opposed them; but when they descended to vulgar abuse; when recourse was had to "gargles" and "emetics" (tho' perhaps habit may have rendered them familiar to the imagination of some persons) when to their aim are drawn the delicate ideas of an age, the public mind must become disgusted, & it must appear evident that the object sought was not the purity of the stage. Tho' confessedly learned, I cannot help thinking that the editor of the Observer may be sometimes at fault; else how can we account for the libelousness on nature's self? In the last number it is said, "that nature, having lost the model of a coxcomb, certainly created Mr. W. that the species might not become extinct." Now the learned editor must mean that nature's memory was so treacherous that it could not retain the idea of a coxcomb, unless after losing the model, she instantly created a new one; or else, she must submit to be thought to have come "from the land of blunders" by adopting the idea that the creation of a new thing prevents the extinction of a thing previously lost. Where the difference between a thing becoming totally lost and becoming extinct is a problem that must remain for the editor of the Observer only to solve. It must now rest with that generous and candid public, who I address, to say, whether the ephemerous pen of slander and of malice shall supersede the honorable feelings of humanity; whether a stranger is to be tormented and agonized for the purpose of filling the pages of the Observer; and finally, whether they are to be deprived of the gratification of witnessing the wonderful powers of Mr. Webster; or, whether they will endeavor to stem the torrent of unmerited obloquy and disingenuous and unqualified abuse.
