By His Excellency, ROBERT WRIGHT, ESQUIRE, GOVERNOR OF MARYLAND, A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS some nefarious villain did on the eighth day of October instant, attempt to assassinate Judge James B. Robins, on his return from Caroline county court, near Denton, and did from an ambuscade fire a ball at him, which entered his right shoulder, and passed out below his right breast, and another ball which passed through the cape of his coat, and struck his ear. And whereas there is reason to believe the said assassin is a certain John Whirlow, alias Joan Rigging, formerly committed to Worcester county goal by said Judge Robins, to answer to a certain criminal and who by two letters to said Judge Robins, threatened to assassinate him, which said Whirlow, alias Rigging, was on the day before the perpetration of said villainy supposed to be in Denton, inquiring when said Judge would return home: And whereas it is the duty of the executive, in the execution of the laws, to endeavor to bring all malefactors to justice; I have thought proper to issue this my Proclamation, and do, by and with the advice and consent of the council, offer Free Hundred Dollars Reward, to any person or persons who shall apprehend and bring to justice, the perpetrator of said offence, in lieu of the reward offered by William Pater, Esquire. Given in council, at the city of Annapolis, under the seal of the state of Maryland, this twenty first day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seven, and of the independence of the United States of America the thirty-second.
