

BOSTON, October 30.
FROM MALAGA.
Captain Foster, from Malaga, who arrived in the outward harbor yesterday, in a short passage, says it was reported that French troops were to occupy the ports of Spain. Such may be the pretence, to conceal the design and preparation for an attack on Gibraltar.

NEW-YORK, November 2.
No arrivals at this port since our last. Below last night, one brig.
Cleared—ship New-York, Moncreif Jamaica; brig Georgia, J. celin, Savannah; Eliza, Cumming, Bordeaux; schr. Thomas, Boudinot, St. Thomas; Wolcott, Allyn, W. Indies.

Extract of a letter from Captain James Brown to the editors of the Gazette, dated La Vera Cruz Sept. 30.—"Capt. Weeks, of the schr. Derne, in lat. 28, long. 60, fell in with the wreck of the schr. Eliza, from Philadelphia bound to St. Jago de Cuba—he took one man off the wreck, nearly exhausted, having had no sustenance for 5 days. This man supposes the rest of the crew must have been lost. The schr. lost her rudder while scudding in a gale, when she immediately broached to, and falling into the trough of the sea capsized. This sailor says he never saw any of the crew after the vessel upset, except the mate; and he held on for two days, but from fatigue and weakness, left his hold and perished."

PHILADELPHIA, November 3.
Arrived, ship Bengal, Donaldson, n. Calcutta, 163 days, bale goods, &c.; schr. Delesder, n. Drinkwater Passamaguddy, spars, &c.; sloop Favorite, Keen, Savannah, 9, woods. Cleared, ship Halcyon, Read, Liverpool; brig Eliza, Coffin, Savannah. Sloop Molly, Rockius, hence, at Nassau. Yesterday arrived, ship Bengal, captain Donaldson, from Calcutta, and last from St. Helena, where he touched the 24th of August, and left there the ship Jefferson, Broch, of New Bedford, from a whaling voyage on the coast of Chili, and was bound to some port in England. The 8th of October, lat. 23, 30, long. 38, 30, spoke brig Susannah, Stanswood, from Alexandria for Barbados, out 32 days, who supplied the Bengal with some flour and other necessaries that she stood in need of.

Trinidad, Sept. 12.
A ship of war has been appointed to take the trade from hence on the 23d of October next.

The price of flour being fixed at eighteen dollars, the half-bushel must weigh nine ounces.

The troop of horse commanded by Joseph H. Nicholson, junr, and the companies commanded by John Elder, John B. Wells, Nathan Brawner and John Mackall, junr, have tendered their services to the executive of Maryland, as part of the quota required by the president of the United States.

Frisby Tilghman, esq., is appointed judge of the orphan's court for Washington county, vice Ignatius Taylor deceased.

A number of vessels from European and West India voyages have been lately barred from a variety of the British ships of war, who have, in almost every instance that we have heard of lately, treated our captains with marked politeness. One of them asked, from whence proceeds this unusual politeness? To which the British officer replied, New Orders! One of our captains was told in Jamaica, that they had new orders, which enjoined them not to press an American who had a protection; and he adds, that it was observed, that even the British officers did not search or even enter the American vessels in Jamaica, to look for men, as formerly. BALTIMORE, November 4, 1807.

Mr. Hewes,
Through the channel of your paper permit me to express to the mayor and to the other civil authorities, as also to the military, particularly capt. William Barney and the First Baltimore Hussars, and capt. Samuel Hollingsworth, and the First Baltimore Troop of Horse, my approbation, for their exertions last evening to preserve the persons and property of myself and others from lawless violence. But to those worthy friends of mine, who filled my drawing room, armed with every necessary weapon to repel such violence, it attempted, no language can sufficiently express my gratitude. And while I live, they may command my every service. The endeavoring proof they have given me of their friendship and zeal is as to myself, infinitely more than a compensation for any indignity meant to be shewn to me by the deceived, deluded individuals, who planned and executed the outrage: But to those of my fellow-citizens who are really anxious for the prosperity of this city, I would make a request, that they will seriously consider of the consequences of such conduct; and how deeply such conduct wounds its best interest. What person would wish to transfer his person, or his capital to a place where life, liberty and property are to be held at the will of an unprincipled Mob! The cities of Philadelphia and New-York, who view with jealousy your rival greatness, will rejoice at your folly; and to the citizens of Annapolis, no act could have been more grateful—How often have they said, that if the seat of government should be removed

to Baltimore, the legislature and the courts of justice would be overawed or insulted by the Mob of the City!

To the misguided promoters of the late proceedings, I would also give one admonition. If they are in reality, what they profess to be, the friends of republican institutions, they are taking the most effectual method to bring such institutions into contempt and detestation.

I have only to add, that as no actual injury was done to persons or property, I rejoice that not a drop of blood has been shed. It would have rendered me unhappy indeed, had a single individual lost his life, while he confined himself to the amusement of attending my effigy to the funeral pile.

The schr. Merchant, McRae, from Havana for Baltimore, was spoke 4 days since, 60 miles southward of cape Henry, in 25 fathoms water, out 10 days.
