

gives its authority from the government of the United States, and its decrees must therefore be obeyed.

It is no less my duty than sincere desire to promote by all the means in my power, the interests of my fellow citizens. To the president of the United States, who expects from me a faithful relation of whatever concerns the welfare of this territory, I have already transmitted such information as I could obtain relative to the conflicting claims to the batters, nor will I omit laying before him, such further representations upon the subject as may be furnished me.

The decision of the supreme court is for the present conclusive;—It however does not exclude (in my opinion) all further enquiry into the right of property to the batters; but such enquiry must be recommended and conducted in submission to the government and conformably to the laws.

I have come among you singly and with confidence;—I look to yourselves for support; we must all aid in the preservation of good order; I am persuaded that no individual in this assembly would wish to raise his arm against the government—And when fellow citizens your chief magistrate unites to a command, an earnest entreaty, that you should forthwith retire in peace to your respective homes, no one I am certain will be found in opposition.

He then explained to them the nature of our government, that no man was above the law, and that we all owed submission to it.

They listened to the governor with great attention; and after he had concluded, testified their approbation of his conduct by cries they proposed that colonel Macarty should be appointed to represent their case to the general government, and seemed well satisfied with the turn the affair had taken. But when the governor's back was turned, col. Belchasse, the commandant of our militia, said, "If Livingston shall prosecute one of us, we will tar and feather him, and throw him in the river." The multitude applauded the speech, and requested him to go to some house and repeat it. Such is the disgraceful conduct of a mob, in opposition to the decree, made by judges of as stern, unshaken integrity as any in America.

General Wilkinson is said to be preparing for the press a defence of his conduct, so far as it relates to the charge alleged against him by the counsel and witnesses of Aaron Burr.

Died on Thursday morning last, very suddenly of the gout in the stomach, major-general Elias Dayton, in the seventy-first year of his age; and on Saturday the corpse was removed to the Presbyterian church, where a funeral sermon was preached by the rev. John M'Dowell, from Joshua xxiii. 14. And behold this day I am going the way of all the earth. The assemblage of citizens was more numerous than we ever knew on the like occasion in this town. Military honors were performed.

The whole proceedings were marked with uncommon solemnity, and evinced the unfeigned affliction felt by all classes of citizens.

In this solemn dispensation of Providence we behold the uncertainty of sublunary things, a fellow mortal in health in the evening, and a corpse before the next rising sun.

At the commencement of our revolution, gen. Dayton, though possessed of a competency of every domestic enjoyment, he balanced not between which side he should take, but with a patriotic ardor devoted himself to the service of his country in the times which tested true patriotism, and never quitted the tilled field until the consummation of our independence.

General Dayton was open, generous and sincere; ardent in his friendship, and scrupulously upright in all the moral duties; in manners easy, unassuming and pleasant; his charity prompt and diffusive; a warm and zealous supporter of the gospel.

Few excelled him in the relative duties of husband and parent; and as a neighbor he was pre-eminent in that virtue.

This venerable patriot of 76, had been engaged in active life ever since he was 19 years of age, and a great part of it in the service of his country.
