## CONGRESS.

### HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

From our Correspondent.

Washington, November 12.

Mr. Nelson presented a petition from sundry inhabitants of Frederick county, MARYLAND, and Adams Co. Pennsylvania, praying the establishment of a post-road, referred to the committee on post-offices and roads.

On motion of Mr. Dan, ordered, that there be printed for the use of this house 1000 copies of the constitution of the U. States, and the amendments which have been ratified.

Mr. Cook, after some prefatory remarks, offered the following:

Resolved, that a committee be appointed to inquire whether any, and if any, what description of claims against the U. S. are barred by the statute of limitation, which in reason and justice ought to be provided for by law. Agreed to, and a committee of 7 appointed.

Mr. Bard, from the committee, reported a "bill to extend the right of suffrage in the Mississippi Territory, and for other purposes" which was read twice and referred to a committee of the whole on Monday.

Mr. Campbell presented a memorial from sundry persons residing within the states of Tennessee and Georgia, praying to be incorporated for the purpose of rendering navigable certain parts of the river Tennessee, &c. referred to a select committee of 7.

The house went into committee of the whole on the report of the committee of elections on the petition of JOSHUA BARNEY. [Mr. McCreery immediately retired. Commodore Barney continued in the gallery.] The report concludes as follows:

Resolved, that Wm. McCreery is entitled to a seat in this house.

This report occasioned an interesting debate. [We shall publish debates at full length as we find room.]

Mr. Findley first spoke in favor of it. He said, the law of Maryland, directing that a candidate should reside in a particular place, was unconstitutional—that the legislature of Maryland had the same right to declare that one candidate should reside in one street and one in another, or one candidate in one house and one in another—that the constitution of the U. States regarded neither time, place nor manner. Mr. Alston could not see why Mr. Barney should contest Mr. McCreery's election, any more than Mr. Moore's, if they were both elected from the county.

Mr. Randolph spoke at great length against the resolution. He said that the question was of the deepest importance; that in venturing to decide on the constitutionality of a law of any particular state, the house were treading on sacred ground; that by declaring Wm. McCreery was entitled to a seat in the house, we were declaring that a law of Maryland was unconstitutional; that although the constitution of the United States required certain qualifications for a member of the house of representatives, yet the states had a right to require other qualifications; that if the report of the committee of elections was sustained by the house, he would not give a peppercorn for the rights of a Maryland elector; that at the same time he was decidedly of opinion that commodore Barney was not entitled to a seat in the house, as he never could consent that any man should sit in that house who had not a majority of the votes of his constituents; and that a concurrence with the report of the committee would form a new era in our history, as it would be the first public declaration of the unconstitutionality of a law of any particular state. This is a very imperfect outline of a debate which continued nearly three hours. Messrs. J. Clay, Smilie, and others, also spoke on the subject; when a motion was made that the committee of the whole rise, report progress, and ask leave to sit again, which was done, and then the house adjourned. The subject will probably be decided on to-morrow, in favor of Mr. McCreery.
