Letter from an officer, dated on board H. M. ship Resolution, in Copenhagen Roads, Sept. 13.

"The harbour of Copenhagen to-day presents a very different scene from that which it did four days ago. Several of the ships were reported last night fit for sea. I was on shore yesterday, for the first time, and every report I had heard respecting the arsenal fell short of my expectation; I have no doubt of its being the first in the world. Every ship lies opposite to her storehouse, and every article necessary for her equipment is close at hand. The stores are immense, some say to the amount of two millions, which I cannot doubt. The light transports are loading with copper and canvas; the timber is shipping, and the ships on the stocks are taking to pieces, to be carried away. The fleet is in the most excellent condition, and consists of very fine ships. They had scuttled them all, ready for sinking, should they deem it expedient. Not even a gun boat is left them. The weather to-day is something better; the last days have been piercing cold. The crown battery has yet its colours flying, as well as the Southern Blocks. An agent for transports informs me, that 60 vessels are ordered into the harbour, to load, I trust a good account will be taken of their cargoes. There is no intercourse with the town yet, and I doubt much whether I shall be able to get a sight of it."

A dreadful and almost unexpected gale of wind has been experienced on the coast of Ire and the 5th and 6th of September. The lives lost are numerous, and the damage sustained immense.

In conformity to the French decree, the brig Nancy, of this port, has recently been captured and carried into Algiers, and there labelled for trial, charged with an intended violation of this decree. She called at Cork with a cargo of flour for information, and was proceeding to Barcelona.

Extract of a letter from an English merchant at Monte Video, dated 7th August.

"All our expectations, by the cowardice and misconduct of the commander in chief, are destroyed. He has been ignominiously defeated at Buenos Ayres, and cast a disgrace upon the British arms, from which they will never recover. The army he took with him, would have conquered the whole province, had they been directed by a brave and skillful officer; they feel it, and are more disgusted than we can be. One month, and we entirely evacuate the country. It is reported the troops are to rendezvous at Rio Janeria, for orders from G. Britain."
