A letter from Captain Field, at Leghorn, received at Salem, mentions the massacre at Constantinople of fifteen thousand Christians by the Turks.

In our list we noticed the capture of the brig Nancy, of this port, by a Spanish privateer, and this morning information reached us of the capture of the schr. Experiment, captain Dickson, from this port for Jamaica, by a French privateer. The Experiment was laden with a cargo of flour only. She is taken into St. Jago de Cuba. So much for Bonaparte's blockading decree, so much for the satisfactory explanation of the French minister "Je pense," that this decree did not apply to American vessels, and so much for minister Armstrong's ready acceptance of said very satisfactory explanation.

Extract of a letter from Lisbon, Sept. 25, received at Philadelphia, "Strong apprehensions are entertained, that the English will be entirely excluded from this country; in which case, large supplies of fish will be wanted from the United States (if they remain neutral.) Beef, Pork, Butter, Cheese, and Naval Stores would then also answer in small quantities. Should the English, in return for our submission to the French, blockade this port, vessels bound here, might put into St. Ubes; whence their cargoes might be conveyed to this place without difficulty. Lemons and Oranges will be very plenty in about two months."

"PEACE LIKE A WAR." Randolph. Late accounts from France (see Boston head) present a prospect to commercial men, not less gloomy than any from England. If these accounts are true, and France has, like Britain, waged war against all neutral trade; why will violent party men condemn the one and flatter the other? What will the honest, honorable, & impartial politician say to the rumored proposition of Mr. Lyon, as contained in our letter from Washington to day? Shall we confiscate British debts, because Britain distresses our commerce, and flatter and praise and bribe France, when she proceeds in the same way?

CONGRESS. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

From our Correspondent. Washington, November 17.

Proceedings this day. At a quarter past 11 o'clock this day, Mr. Lyon, observed, that he had received some information since the house last adjourned, which he thought should be communicated to the house in a private manner, he therefore moved that the doors should be closed. The galleries were then cleared, and the doors continued closed until nearly 2 o'clock. [It is said that the injunction of secrecy, was taken off before the doors were opened; nothing relating to the house afterwards; but it is said that Mr. Lyon made a motion TO CONFISCATE BRITISH DEBTS, prevent the Transfer of Stock, &c. &c.]

After the doors were opened, the committee, to whom was referred so much of the President's message, as relates to aggressions within our ports and waters, to violations of our jurisdiction, and measures necessary for the protection of our ports and harbors, made a report in part. This report is very long, and states the circumstances attending the attack on the Chesapeake, &c. It was made the order of the day for Monday next, and ordered to be printed.

Mr. Montgomery, offered the following resolution, which was agreed to: Resolved, That the committee on Post-offices, and Post Roads, be instructed to inquire into the expediency of discontinuing the Post-Route, from Annapolis to Rock Hall, in Maryland, and of establishing a post-route from Baltimore to Rock Hall.

On motion of Mr. Newton, the order of the day on the report of the committee of elections, on the petition of Joshua Barney, was postponed until to-morrow.

Mr. J. Clay offered the following resolution, which was agreed to: Resolved, That a committee (of 5) be appointed to consider whether any, and, if any, what alterations are necessary in the several acts for the encouragement of learning and the promotion of the useful arts.

The house then adjourned about half after 2 o'clock.
