And if a Brigadier so doing, at the request of the civil authority, sets an example dangerous to the rights and liberties of the people, and assumes power hostile to our constitution, which deserves the just reprehension of freemen-I would ask, how ought to be considered the aforesaid conduct of the colonel? Or are we to suppose that greater danger is to be apprehended for our liberties when military orders are issued with the approbation of the civil authority, by Brigadier General Stricker, a native American, and an old and meritorious revolutionary officer, than when, without consulting the civil authority, they are issued by colonel William Lowry!
