At the late meeting at the Pantheon, composed of democrats without alloy, one of whom was this same Colonel Lowry, we find they resolved—That the conduct of certain Civil Officers, in the city of Baltimore, in calling on the military to suppress an apprehended riot, is an example dangerous to the rights and liberties of the people; and that they can only view the conduct of such men as an assumption of power hostile to our constitution; intended to suppress the public sentiment; and that they deserve the just reprobation of freemen.

I would now ask, if a colonel of a regiment has a right to cause his troops to patrol the city, to guard against apprehended injury; or to give any orders of a military nature to its citizens, not injurious to the peace of the commonwealth, even without the permission of the civil authority? Can it possibly be supposed that there would be any impropriety in a Brigadier-General issuing orders of a military nature to his brigade, for the express purpose of preserving the peace of the commonwealth; and that too with the permission of the civil authority?

And if a Brigadier so doing, at the request of the civil authority, sets an example dangerous to the rights and liberties of the people, and assumes power hostile to our constitution, which deserves the just reprobation of freemen—I would ask, how ought to be considered the aforesaid conduct of the colonel? Or are we to suppose that greater danger is to be apprehended for our liberties when military orders are issued with the approbation of the civil authority, by Brigadier-General Stricker, a native American, and an old and meritorious revolutionary officer, than when, without consulting the civil authority, they are issued by colonel William Lowry?

His "book" will find dull sale after the occasion passes by, and the prevailing curiosity subsides. His good name, fame and reputation may suffer in the interim. And above all, morality and the christian religion too must sustain an "heavy inconvenience." But for the banks being crowded with immoral officers and scoffers at christianity, the Bible would this day have been "explained by question and answer," new light thrown upon darkness, and the perplexing and inexplicable intricacies of holy writ made familiar to the meannest understanding, by a humble son of St. Patrick.

CONGRESS.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

From our Correspondent.

Washington, November 20.

Proceedings this day.

Mr. Park presented a petition from the trustees of the university of Vincennes, (Ind. Ter.) praying Congress to lay a tax on salt which may be manufactured at the Saline Works, on the Wabash, and on Indian licences; and that the proceeds thereof may be given to said university. Referred to the committee of commerce and manufactures.

Mr. Epes presented a petition from sundry inhabitants of the city of Washington, praying that the act of incorporation may be altered so as to entitle them to vote by wards instead of general elections. Referred to a select committee of five, with leave to report by bill or otherwise.

The house went into committee of the whole on the bill authorizing the erection of a bridge over the river Potomac. The remaining blanks were filled up, when the committee of the whole rose, reported the bill with the amendments, in which the house concurred, and it was ordered to be read a third time on Monday next.

The house then went into a committee on the bill allowing additional compensation to the secretaries of the Indiana, Mississippi, Louisiana and Michigan territories. One or two amendments were made, in which the house concurred, and the bill was ordered to be read a third time on Monday next.

Mr. Williams moved, that when the house adjourn, they adjourn to Monday next. Mr. Crowninshield said, he hoped the house would not adjourn till Monday. It was just announced in the papers, that dispatches had been received from our ministers in London: they might not be of a very recent date, but they might be of importance, as we had been so long without hearing from them. In what situation should we be (he asked) should the President in the mean time receive those dispatches and wish to lay them before the house? He hoped the house would not lose two days in the week, when we were perhaps on the eve of a war. Mr. Williams's motion was lost. And then the house adjourned (a few minutes after one o'clock).

So premature and unexpected a loss, has indeed deeply wounded the domestic happiness of her relatives in this state and in the state of New-York, and will be long lamented by her numerous and respectable friends in New-Orleans. She has left one child, a fine boy, little more than four years old.
