CONGRESS.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

From our Correspondent.

Washington, November 21.

Proceedings this day.

On motion of Mr. Crowninshield, Resolved, That the clerk of the house of representatives furnish the respective standing committees with such maps as may be required by the said committees.

On motion of Mr. Newton, Ordered, That each of the standing committees be furnished by the clerk with Gaydon's Digest of the Laws of the United States.

Mr. Clifton, from the committee of report and unfinished business, made a report in part, which was ordered to be printed.

The house went into committee of the whole on the report of the committee to whom was referred the petition of Sir James

The report of the committee concludes

as follows: Resolved, That it shall be lawful for the President of the U. S. to obtain by purchase at a reasonable price, for the use of the public, the exclusive right to the *System* invented by Sir James Jay, and submitted by him to the executive department: provided, that in the opinion of the President it shall be of public utility and importance to possess the same. [The *System* here mentioned, is the secret of preparing *Sympathetic Ink*, which is stated to have been of essential service during the revolutionary war.] After some discussion, the question was taken on agreeing to the resolution, and it was carried in the affirmative, ayes 80, noes 48. The committee of the whole then rose, and reported their agreement to the resolution; and on the motion to concur, Mr. D. R. Williams, after remarking that the decision made in committee of the whole was novel and unprecedented, called for the ayes and noes: They were accordingly taken, and the resolution was agreed to, ayes 84, noes 53. The resolution was referred to a select committee for the purpose of bringing in a bill.

The principal objections to this resolution were, that there was no certainty of this invention being still a secret, or that it would hereafter remain so; that even if it were, it would be of little use, as it might be discovered, and as there were other and better methods of secret communication; and that the house were voting away the public money, without knowing for what purpose. On the other hand it was argued, that the house might be satisfied as to the composition being yet a secret, and that they might demand security for its being kept so; that the use of it had been of great service to Gen. Washington, during the revolutionary war; that if we did not avail ourselves of it, some other nation might get possession of it; and, that its value might be fixed by the bill to be brought in.

Mr. Van Cortlandt presented a memorial from Peter Landais, praying compensation for services performed during the revolution. R. referred to the committee of claims.

The house then adjourned a little before two o'clock.
