The inhabitents were at liberty to correspond as usual, but they refuse to have any intercourse with the British.

Almost the whole of the valuable property of the Abergavenny East-Indiaman has been recovered from the wreck of that ship, near the race of Portland. Chests, containing 70,000 dollars, and also 30 pipes of wine, have been weighed up from her in the course of the present summer.

ADMIRALTY-OFFICE Sept. 29. My Lords commissioners of the admiralty having received information that the lights in the Cattegat have been removed by the Danes : this is to give notice, for the information of the masters and pilots of his majesty's ships and navigation in general, that it is the intention of their lordships as soon as possible, to eause temporary floating lights to be moored on the point of the Anholl reef, and also on the point of the Scaw. CORK, Sept. 26.

The ship Robert, of Dublin, Reid, master arrived yesterday at Cove. She sailed from Trinidad the 22d of July last, in company with nunety-four sail of merchantmen, under convoy of Northumberland man of war, and parted them n Tuesday morning last in thick weather-the whole of the fleet, as she supposes, not then with the convoy. Two more of the fleet are bound for this port.

"Her royal majesty the Queen, and her royal highness the Princess Sophia Wilhelmina, arrived here on the 14th inst. at midnight. Her royal majesty was met without the town by the commanding naval officers, vice-admiral Pake and his Staff, who followed her majesty's carriage through the town: at the gates of the city the magistrates and livery were assembled, and before the house inhabited by his majesty, the Noblemen of his suite received her majesty; the castle fired a salute, and the garrison paraded in the

"Yesterday, at half past 12 o'clock in the morning, the Troja frigate dropped anchor in the road-his royal majesty the king of France and his royal highness the Duke D'Angouleme were on board; but as they would not allow the commander of the frigate, major Nordeashas, to hoist any colours, their arrival was not known until major d'Avaray, on the part of the king, his master, came on shore to wait on his royal majesty. The king thereupon immediately ordered vice-admiral Pake to go on board the frigate. but he was met half way by his french majesty, who, in order to prevent all preparations for his reception, would not wait the return of Count d'Avaray. The king ent on shore, and proceeded to the house got ready for him, and a guard of honor drew up before the house.

On account of the c ntinuance of his majesty's illness, and as the illustrious travellers also wanted some rest after an unpleasant sea voyage, his majesty ordered his friend, lord chamberlain Barron Munck to e ingratulate the above illustrious personages on their safe arrival, and to express his majesty's wish to see them this morning at half past 11 o'clock. Count Lowenheilm was also sent by her majesty for the same

" At the time above mentioned his royal French majesty arrived with the duke D'Angouleme at the house inhabited by the king, attended by the barron Munck his majesty's first lord chamberlain, who had been sent to conduct them thither. On the stair case and in the great hall the officers of the navy formed a double line; and in one place all the officers were drawn up who are knights of the royal French order, Pour le Merite Militaire (for military merit.) At the door his majesty was received by the whole court, and in the king's anti-room were her majesty, and her two ladies of honor, the countess Oxentierno and her daughters, who followed his royal French majesty, and the duke D'Angouleme, to the door of his majesty's room which they entered. After an hours conversation with the king and queen, the noblemen belonging to his French majesty's suit were introduced and presented to their majesties, and thereupon the illustrious travellers reached the house which they inhabit. - In the afternoon they took a view of the dock yard.

. His French majesty is attended by count d'Avaray, duke de Grammont, count Daman, and Chevalier de Rivier.

FRANKFORT, Aug. 28.
The Baron Ferdinand de Guicomb, has had a singular duel with an English officer of superior rank in Sicily. They quarelled at Palermo. The Englishman proposed that they should fight with pistols, which the baron consented to, on condition that the duel should take place on Mount Etna, and that the pody of him who was killed, should be thrown into the crater of that volcano. The duel was actually fought, but the Englishman at the second shot, was only wound ed in the arm, and the baron only received a ball in his hat.

CONGRESS.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. From our Correspondent.

Washington, November 23. Proceedings this day.

Mr. Elliott, from the committee appointed on the subject, reported " a bill extending jurisdiction in certain cases to the territorial coasts, and for other purposes;" which was twice, and referred to a committee of e on Thursday.

Mr. Morrow offered a resolution, the object of which was, that a committee formerly appointed should be instructed to inquire whether provision ought not to be made by law for placing on the pension list of the U. S. persons who had received wounds in the service of the United States since the revolutionary war, and who were called into service under any law for the protection of the frontiers, whether such persons were of the volunteer corps or militia, &c. Agreed

The "bill allowing additional compensation to the secretaries of the Mississippi Indiana, Louisiana & Michigan territories, was read the third time and passed.

The "bill authorising the erection of a bridge over the river Potomac" was read

the third time. Mr. R. Nelson moved, that it be recommitted to a select committee. He said that this bill was extremely prejudicial to the people of this state, and if it must pass, as he supposed it must, he wished to make it as palatable as possible. His principal objection to the bill was, the perpecuity of the charter; he wished it to be confined to a limitted number of years.

This motion was opposed by Mr. Lewis and Mr. Gardenier; and advocated by Messrs. Sloan, Smilie, Key, Crowninshield, & others; when the question was taken on recommit-ting the bill, and carried, ayes 72. A committee of 5 members was then appointed for

the purpose. message was received from the president of the U S transmitting, agreeably to the promise contained in his message, the testimony in the case of AARON BURR. message and documents were referred to the committee to whom was referred a revision of the laws on the subject of enterprizes against the public peace, &c. [The speaker soon after informed the house, that a sufficient number of the documents referred to in the message had been printed, and would be laid on the tables of the members to-morrow

morning.]
Mr. G. W. Campbell, from the committee of ways and means, to whom was referred the memorial of sundry measurers of salt and coal of the New York district made a report, concluding as follows: Resolved, that the memorialists have leave to withdraw their memorial: Referred to a committee of

the whole to morrow. Mr. Thomas moved, that the reports of the commissioners on the claims of the re-fugees from the British provinces of Canada and Nova Scotia, be referred to a select

committee of 3 Carried.

Mr. G. W. Campbell, from the committee of ways and means, to whom were referred the petitions of the inspectors of customs of tha ports of Baltimore, New-York and Boston, made a report, concluding as fol-lows: Resolved, That the petitioners have leave to withdraw their petitions. Referred to the committee of the whole, to whom was referred the petition of the measurers of salt and coal, mentioned above.

The house went into committee of the whole on the "bill extending the right of suffrage in the Mississippi Territory, and for other purposes."

Mr. Troup moved to strike out the first section of the bill, on the ground that it was contrary to the principles of the articles of agreement and cession between the United States and the state of Georgia.

This motion occasioned some discussion; when, on motion of Mr. Sloan, the committee of the whole rose, reported progress, and obtained leave to sit again. Ind then the house adjourned, (about 8 o'clock.)
