This answer is of a nature on which it by no means falls within the powers of the American envoys to decide, and it now becomes their duty to submit the whole, in the speediests manner to their government. Mr. Munroe is preparing for an early departure, but he has not yet determined whether he will go out in the Augustus or the Revenge. The latter, it

Newport, George Town, (S. C.) the Potomac, Patuxent and James Rivers, Annapolis, Amboy, Cape Ann, Kennebeck, Da-mascotta, St. George's, Passamaquoddy, &c. The report concludes with two resolutions, recommendin, in substance, that the president of the United States be authorised to cause to be erected such fortifications, in addition to those heretofore erected, as, with the assistance of ganboats, shall be sufficient to preserve the respect due to the constituted authorities of the nation, and the appropriation of dollars for the purpose ; and, secondly, the expediency of also authorising the president to cause to be built gunboats, for the protection of our ports and harbors, and to arm, equip built and man the same, and the appropriation of dollars for the purpose. NAVY DEPARTMENT. 18th November, 1807.

Sir,

In answer to your letter of this day's date. I have the honor to state.

1st. That it is impossible at this time to state precisely, what pr portion of the extraordinary expences incurred by the navy department since the 22d day of June last, has been paid for. as all the accounts of the navy agents have not been received ; but fr m a view of such accounts as have been rendered and received, and of the reminent ces made to the agents the proportion of extraordinary expences actually been paid for is estimated at about 160,000 dollars, which sum has been paid out of the appropriations made for the support of the navy for the year 1807, by act of congress, passed 7th Janutry, 1807.

2d. that by the returns made, it does not appear that the navy department has in any instance paid more ore agreed to pay more than the cash price for any one of the articles constituting these extra ordinary expences ; but to enable the committee to form for themselves a satisfactory opinion upon this point, I take the liberty of submitting to their consideration the accompanying paper, marked A. which is an ex hibit of the prices given at different periods, for cannon, salt-petre, powder, shot, copper &c. which are the principal articles of the extraordinary expenses.

3d. That none of the articles purchased and stated in the estimate as constituting the extraordinary expences of the navy department since the 22d day of June last, were authorised by any previous approprition law. They were all procured without " awaiting a previous and special sanction by law", as has been communicated by the president to congress, in his message at the opening of the present session. They are such articles as the crisis called for, and such as congress has annually auth rised and provided for.
