CONGRESS.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

From our Correspondent.
Washington, November 26.

Proceedings this day.

Mr. Lewis from the committee to whom
was recommended the bill authorizing the
erection of a bridge over the river Potomac,
(for the purpose of making some amend-
ments to it) reported the bill so amended.
Referred to a committee of the whole to-
morrow.

A petition was presented from ———,
praying congress to take off the duty on the
but lately imported into the U. S. to be ec-
tezed in Washington City, to the memory
of the officers who fell before Tripoli.
Referred to a committee of ways and means.

The house then took up the bill extend-
ing the right of suffrage in the Mississippi
Territory, and for other purposes, a debate
of some length took place; occasioned by
the amendment offered by Mr. Bibb, pro-
viding that the law shall not take effect
without the approbation of the state of
Georgia. This debate took up nearly the
whole of the day. The speeches of Mr.
Sloan and Mr. Lyon occasioned great mirth
in the house; they were in answer to Mr.
Gardiner, who contended that it was not
always good policy to extend the elective
franchise to men who possessed no interest
in the soil, which doctrine also gave rise
to some severe remarks from Mr. Poinde-
ster and Mr. Smilie.

It was contended in favor of the amend-
ment, that this law would be extremely re-
pugnant to the people of Georgia; that
congress had no right to pass such a law,
without the consent of Georgia, according
to the articles of agreement and cession be-
tween that state and the United States;
that there was no evidence before the house;
to show that the people of the Mississippi
Territory were dissatisfied with their pre-
sent mode of government; and that it
would be improper to extend the elective

franchise at this time. On the other hand
it was said, that congress had a right un-
der the constitution, to pass this law; that
it would be humiliating in the congress of
the United States to ask the consent of an
individual state to any of their laws; that
the people of that Territory were extreme-
ly anxious to have this privilege, and might
be dissatisfied if it were not granted, and
that the elective franchise ought always to
be extended, whenever it could consistently
be done.

The question was then taken by ayes and
noes on Mr. Bibb's amendment, and it was
lost—Ayes 15, noes 86.

The bill was then ordered to be engrossed
for a third reading to-morrow.

Mr. J. Clay presented a petition from a
committee of the merchants of Philadel-
phia, stating that they had suffered under a
construction of the law respecting draw-
backs.

Mr. Williams called for the reading of the
petition. The clerk began to read it, when
a motion was made to adjourn. Some dis-
cussion took place whether this motion
was in order; the speaker decided that it
was—and then the house adjourned at 3
o'clock.
