CONGRESS. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. [TAKEN for the FEDERAL GAZETTE.] Washington, December 9.

Mr. Boyle, from the committee of public land, presented "a bill making further provision for the sale of the sections of lands heretofore reserved for the future disposition of congress. Referred to a committee of the whole on Monday.

Mr. Dawson laid before the house a letter from the secretary of war, inclosing an estimate of the sums necessary for the pay and subsistence of 32,800 men, officers included &c. Referred to the committee of the whole, to whom was referred so much of the Presidene's message as relates to military and naval establishments.

The house proceeded to consider the report of the committee of the whole (yesterday) on the bill from the senate making appropriations for building 183 additional gunboats. Considerable debate arose on agreeing to said bill, occasioned by a motion to strike out the words " 188 gunboats," and insert "124 gunboats and 4 frigates of 44 guns each." The question was taken on the amendment, and it was lost, ayes 19. The bill was then ordered to be read a third time to morrow.
