

solitely necessary to this continent; and in the next place, if their circulation upon the continent be rendered more difficult and circuitous, they cannot circulate to the same extent, and with the same facility, after, as before the restriction. It follows there-fore, that the consumption will be less—but we trust the reduction will not be so great as the enemy expects. It is we fear, too much to attempt to prove, that our trade will not suffer at all.

Sir Sydney Smith, arrived on Monday Evening at Plymouth, and immediately hoisted his flag on board the London, of 98 guns.

His Majesty is expected in town, this day to hold a private levee at Privy Council at the Queen's Palace.

At two o'clock, yesterday afternoon, a Cabinet Council assembled at the Foreign Office. Their deliberations lasted until half after four. The members present were—the Lord Chancellor, Earl Westmoreland & Camden, Lord Hawkesbury and Mulgrave, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer. Earl Bathurst was admitted to the conference; and which it may be drawn that it related to the rumored project of a general blockade, as the noble lord is at the head of the board of trade. After the council broke up, Mr. Wilberforce had an audience of the cabinet ministers.

Mr. G. H. Rose, who is charged with a particular mission to the government of the United States, sailed on Monday, (the 9th) from Lymington, in the Statira frigate, for the Chesapeake.

FRENCH INTERFERENCE WITH SEAMEN.
Four seamen, who had regular protections, from New-Orleans, as citizens of that territory, having entered on board the American ship Fortune, captain Lister, at Philadelphia, on their arrival at the City of Santo Domingo, deserted from the ship, thereby leaving her in distress, and applied to Gen. Ferrand to release them from their service and engagements. On which captain Lister laid their protections before the general, and requested that they might be delivered up. But Mr. Ferrand, regardless of these circumstances, ordered the captain to pay their wages, to deliver their clothing, and against the remonstrances of the captain, on the plea that they were Frenchmen, compelled him to discharge them!

SPANISH INTERFERENCE WITH SEAMEN.
Captain Bacon, of the brig Eliza, arrived at this port from the Havana, has reported at the custom house, that one of his seamen was impressed at the Havana, by the guard-boat, on the plea that he was a Spaniard.

CONGRESS.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

[TAKEN FROM THE FEDERAL GAZETTE.]
Washington, December 15.
Proceedings this day.

Mr. Milner moved that the memorial from the merchants and traders of the city of Philadelphia (presented a few weeks ago) be referred to the committee of the whole to whom was yesterday referred, the memorial of the merchants of Boston (presented yesterday) on the same subject. He also called for the *eyes* and *noes* on this motion.

The motion was opposed by Mr. Lyon and Mr. Chandler, and supported Mr. Upham and Mr. Chittenden.

Mr. Gardner moved that the previous question be taken (viz: "shall the main question be now put?")

Mr. Milner called for the *eyes* and *noes* on this motion also. They were taken, and Mr. G's motion was carried, ayes 64, noes 52.

Some conversation took place whether this decision precluded any further debate on the original motion. The speaker declared that it did. Mr. Randolph appealed from this decision, and called for the *eyes* & *noes*, which were about to be taken (after some discussion) when Mr. Pitkin moved that the decision of the question be postponed until to-morrow.

Mr. Randolph called for the *eyes* and *noes* on this motion. They were taken, and the motion was lost, ayes 48, noes 69.

The question was then taken by ayes and noes, on the correctness of the speaker's decision; and there were against it, 106—for it 14; so it was decided to be incorrect, and that debate could be had in the house after the previous question was taken.

The original motion was therefore before the house, viz: the reference of the memorial as above mentioned. Mr. Ely spoke in favour of the motion.

Mr. Blount moved that the further consideration of the motion be postponed till next Monday week.

Mr. Milner opposed this motion, & urged that of referring the memorial. He said that the merchants of Philadelphia had at present nearly eight millions of dollars worth of property all at in the India trade, a great part of which would probably be implicated under the operation of the non importation law as it now stood; and he hoped the house would not suffer these merchants to incur so great a loss.

Mr. Gardener and Mr. Dana also spoke against Mr. Blount's motion, and in favor of referring the petition; and Mr. Sawyer and Fisk, and others, against referring it.

Mr. Milner called for the *eyes* and *noes* on the motion for postponement.

They were ordered to be taken. Mr. Kelly spoke in favor of referring the memorial; when the question was taken by ayes and noes on postponing, & lost, ayes 44, noes 60.

The question was then taken by ayes and noes on referring the memorial, and it was lost, ayes 44, n es 56.

And then the house adjourned.
