VETERINARY SURGEON, Or FARRIER, No. 41, JONES STREET, Old Town, Continues to offer his professional services to the citizens of Baltimore, and informs them that he has opened a Shop, in the above street, for the Shoeing of Horses feet, according to the modern improved plan; that is on the following principle:

The Frog of the foot never to be pared, to bear equal weight with the shoe, and the shoe to be forged in such a manner as to bear a level surface on the ground and at the same time a sufficient space between the shoe and sole of the foot.

It would appear, at first thought that the frog pressing on the ground, would injure the horse; but when we consider the shape, situation, quality and composition of the frog, together with its connection with the external and internal parts of the foot, we must acknowledge it was placed there for most essential purposes. It is elastic, and the shape of a wedge, convex, and placed in the centre of the heels.

This wedge like shape, and convexity must be intended for some purpose, and that is to keep the heels expanded, which operation takes place in the following manner; allow the frog to press on the ground, and whenever the horse sets his foot down, the frog ascends, that is, it rises up between the heels; when he takes it up, the frog descends and by this alternate motion the heels are preserved expanded. The foot forms half a circle, which is the natural shape of a colt's foot, and a proper elastic motion is kept up in the parts composing the heels—again, the frog, when it suffers to press on the ground, prevents the horse from slipping and by its elastic quality acts as a spring.

It is found by experience that a perpetual pressure may be given to a living substance, and it will be attended with no inconvenience, when a partial pressure will cause most exquisite pain.

This is demonstrated in a person whose living is by the hammer; he feels no inconvenience; when a person, whose hand is soft, begins to work with the hammer for a little time, he feels great pain. The same is also the case with the frog of the horse's foot, though it is cut and raised from the ground, as it is the common practice, and not admitted to press on an even surface; it will meet with pressure on gravelly ground, or any uneven surface; therefore it is better it should have perpetual or constant pressure.

Independent of the reasonable appearance of the above theory, no one has cause for fear in the practice. It has been adopted for several years past at the Veterinary College of London, and in numerous instances in this city, by my direction, with the most salutary effects.

The plan of Shoeing in frost differs from the plan in warmer weather. It is expected these few observations are sufficient, but any further explanation will be given by calling on me.

SUMAN, of said county, praying the benefit of the act for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors, on the terms mentioned in said act; a schedule of his property, and a list of his creditors on oath, as far as he can ascertain them, as directed by the said act, being annexed to his petition, and that the said county court, being satisfied by competent testimony, that the said William Suman, has resided the two preceding years within the state of Maryland, prior to the passage of the said act, and the said William Suman, at the time of presenting his petition as aforesaid, having produced to the said court, the assent in writing of so many of his creditors as have due to them the amount of two thirds of the debts due by him at the time of passing the said act.

It is thereupon adjudged and ordered by the said court, that the said William Suman, (by causing a copy of this order to be inserted in some one of the newspapers in the City of Baltimore, every other day for 3 months, successively, before the twenty-ninth day of March next) give notice to his creditors to appear before the said county court, at the Court House, in the said county, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon of the said 29th day of March next, for the purpose of recommending a trustee for their benefit, on the said William Suman, then and there taking the oath by said act prescribed for delivering up his property.
