Having seen an audacious charge against me in form of an advertisement dated Decemember 10, in the Federal Gazette, calculated to destroy my reputation, in the estimation of the public, I therefore deem it necessary to show the falshood of E. F.'s account.

This man knows very well, into what a dilemma I was brought by getting his notes discounted; that, according to his own instructions, he was willing to have them done at any discount, however enormous; and that, he advised me to purchase goods for him at my price.

This man—do mark his whining treachery and inconsistency—this same man, failed for twenty six thousand dollars; he attributes this stoppage of payment to me. Now, leaving out of view, the statement of his being in my debt; how could the loss of nine hundred dollars cause a failure for twenty six thousand? I admit that I sold goods to Shammy; but, when he is gone to jail, how can I recover them? Mr. F. knows it is impossible.

And does Mr. Fitzgerald mean to deny, that he purchased a note of his own indorsing, for half its value, when he had the very goods in his possession, for which the note was given? This was indeed "a new mode of winding," and of his own invention!

Of his infamous offer of "two hundred dollars reward," it is more properly the subject of criminal prosecution, than of any notice here.
