To the Members

Of the LATE First Baltimore Hussars.

No passion can assume a greater variety of shapes than ambition; it can be modest or bold, reserved or open, candid or wise, religious or political. ON the 7th inst. you were called together by C. S. Ridgely, in these words: "The first Baltimore Hussars are requested to meet at Peck's Hotel, on Tuesday evening next, at 7 o'clock."

"C. S. RIDGELY, Lt. Com." From such a notice, not much was to be expected; for on all other occasions, "business of importance," or something of that nature, was mentioned; but as this meeting was a stroke of ambition, you see it simple, as above stated.

The journal of proceedings of that evening I have seen; it goes on to state, that at a meeting held, &c. Mr. Lemuel Taylor in the chair; after stating that Mr. John Smith, 2d Lieut. had sent in his resignation; that Mr. Isaac M'Kim, cornet, being appointed aid de camp to gen. Smith; that capt. Barney being absent, and his return to this country being uncertain, in this disorganised state of the troop, it was necessary to go into the appointment of new officers; 32 members being present, 23 were for and 9 against the motion; a nomination, however, took place, when C. S. Ridgely was appointed captain, Lemuel Taylor 1st Lieut. Isaac M'Kim 2d Lieut. and Mr. Henry, cornet. In these proceedings I beg leave to remark, the uncertainty of captain Barney's return is particularly mentioned, although Mr. C. S. Ridgely was hourly expected in Baltimore, when Mr. Ridgely had the modesty to request me to resign my brother's commission, which was refused, from the very reason that captain Barney was hourly expected, "when he might act as he pleased." Now let me go back to the notice for the meeting. If a general nomination of officers was to be the object, pray what is the reason Mr. Ridgely did not state it? Does he suppose that the gentlemen of that troop will be dragged and roped into his views, by getting himself nominated and elected in such a manner? I am satisfied they will not, as scarcely more than one half the troop were present.

I will now go on to state what took place afterwards—Mr. Ridgely next day waited upon General Stricker, and informed him of the proceedings; when the general told him his opinion, and requested or recommended to Mr. Ridgely not to make application to the governor for their commissions until the return of Captain Barney, this Mr. Ridgely promised to do. Then gentlemen, what will be your surprise, when I inform you, that by the next mail Mr. Ridgely did make a demand for the commissions for himself, Mr. Taylor, and Mr. Henry, observing that Mr. M'Kim had resigned, but when another 2d Lieut. was appointed, he would forward on his name for a commission. Now for the black and serious part of the charge. Mr. Ridgely begins his letter to the Governor and Council by informing them that a letter from General Smith, inclosing an extract from the governor to him, informing him that the Baltimore Hussars being a volunteer troop, under the act of Congress, &c. their commissions expired on the 18th April, & it would be necessary for them to renew their commissions under the present act, then goes on to state the votes and proceedings as if in consequence of that letter, dated the same day (10th April) from the governor, on which the meeting was held, when it is plain, from the date of the notice (7th April) Mr. Ridgely could have had no information of that circumstance, as the votes & proceedings of their journal, as before cited, proves it. But for fear that the Governor and Council might have objections to grant commissions to him and his friends, what does he do?—O shame where is thy blush!—he writes the Governor and Council, "That Capt. Barney left this place for the Havana since the Embargo Law, where he now is, and that was the reason why he was not re-elected." Now gentlemen, what think you of this new captain, (this second Jaffier) he descends to become an informer, and inform on whom, on his sworn bosom friends? Was there any necessity for such information to succeed? certainly not, the commissions of the troop expired by law, on the 18th April—the whole troop were on a footing, they could choose whom they pleased, a part did choose Mr. Ridgely, that was enough—the Governor would have as willingly granted commissions without that base information, as with it—but Mr. Ridgely's insinuation, that capt. B's infringing the Embargo Law was the reason that he was not re-elected, he there speaks for the troop in general—how can that be, look at the nominations of that evening, see whether no other persons, supposed to have infringed the Embargo Law, were present—does conscience act at will—how long has Mr. Ridgely been appointed?—does on such occasions—how long has it been a crime in his eyes to be supposed in opposition to the laws of the general government I leave him to his bitter reflections, assuring him most solemnly, that on the return of Capt. Barney, he will meet that fate which a false friend merits and pledge myself to that effect.

To you Gentlemen of the troop, after having stated a few facts, (and much more will be proved hereafter) I leave you to reflect, whether your honor will permit you to serve, not under, but with such a man. JOHN BARNLY. May 17
