Mechanics' Bank of Baltimore,

APRIL 25, 1808.

The stockholders are informed that, in conformity with the charter, an election will take place at the Banking House, on Monday the 6th day of June next, between the hours of 9 A. M. and 3 P. M. for thirteen directors to manage the affairs of the Institution for 12 months next ensuing thereafter, eight of whom at least, must be practical Mechanics, or Manufacturers agreeably to the following definition of the Law:

"No person shall be considered as coming within the description of Practical Mechanic, or Manufacturer, unless he hath learned and actually wrought at some Mechanical or Manufacturing trade for the term of three years at least, and for twelve months next preceding his election, hath been carrying on some Mechanical, or Manufacturing branch of business either in his own person or with his own funds or by workmen, or apprentices, by him hired or employed."

By the Charter one fifth of the present board of Directors are rendered ineligible at the ensuing election.

To the Members

Of the LATE First Baltimore Hussars.

"No passion can assume a greater variety of shapes than ambition; it can be modest or bold, reserved or open, candid or wise, religious or political."

ON the 7th inst. you were called together by C. S. RIDGELY, in these words:

"The first Baltimore Hussars are requested to meet at Peck's Hotel, on Tuesday evening next, at 7 o'clock."

"C. S. RIDGELY, Lt. Com"

From such a notice, not much was to be expected; for on all other occasions, "business of importance," or something of that nature, was mentioned; but as this meeting was a stroke of ambition, you see it simple, as above stated.

The journal of proceedings of that evening I have seen; it goes on to state, that at a meeting held, &c. Mr. Lemuel Taylor in the chair; after stating that Mr. John Smith, 2d lieutenant, had sent in his resignation; that Mr. Isaac M'Kim, cornet, being appointed ad de camp to gen. Smith; that capt. Barney being absent, and his return to this country being uncertain, in this discontinued state of the troop, it was necessary to go into the appointment of new officers. 32 members being present, 23 were for and 9 against the motion; a nomination, however, took place, when C. S. RIDGELY was appointed captain, Lemuel Taylor 1st lieutenant, Isaac M'Kim 2d lieutenant, and Mr. Henry, cornet. In these proceedings I beg leave to remark, the uncertainty of captain
