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I did not stop, but in a few moments after this we came back on the retreat, and I then saw the claimant on a stretcher being carried to the rear. I do not know who was carrying him. I did not stop and in passing saw he was being taken care of and I went on. I did not ask any question. On the retreat Henry J. Puller was the next file man to me. I don't know whether he stopped or not, but I do remember seeing him when we retreated. The next man who stopped when the claimant was, but I did not see him. I did not see the claimant again for three or four weeks and I understood he was in the hospital wounded. I heard the orderly Sergeant James Johnson, say Mr. Clapp was wounded Johnson is dead. All I know of the claimant being wounded is that I saw him fall and as I came back on the retreat saw him being carried off the field on a stretcher. A shell exploded over our heads, and this caused me to look around, in the way I came to see the claimant fall. The shell killed a man named Spanger Jones of our company. I do not know whether any one else was injured by this explosion or not. I am satisfied the claimant was being carried off the field and that he was not walking when he came back to the company he complained of his right shoulder, and that it was caused by being struck by a shell at the Charge on Fort Gilman. He did not seem to have good use of the arm like he did before he got struck. The Second Rifle and he complained more of it in rainy or damp weather than at any other time. He went on duty soon after this, but was excused from duty sometimes. All I know about this is that he was complaining of the arm and went to see the doctor and was excused from duty - I do not remember that he complained of anything but his arm and shoulder. I do not recollect that he was lame or
