 remained rescued from all duties  
 until I was honorably discharged  
 from the Army which was about  
 May 10<sup>th</sup> 1866. and I still remain  
 ed a cripple and disabled to do  
 any thing for over a year under  
 Dr. Johnson and Dr. Kings the  
 the doctors attended me all the  
 time. and I still remained for 18  
 years and over under the treat-  
 ment of Dr. Shute until Dr  
 Shute died. and now under the  
 treatment of the doctors of John  
 Hopkins Hospital. the injuries I  
 received falling in the trenchment  
 at Ft. Mc. Morda is mentioned me.  
 and I still remain a maimed man. had  
 on both sides yet. and it also hurt

a maim in my left hand and  
 also injured my left knee and I  
 can scarcely use it yet. and still  
 suffering with it a great deal today.  
 from it. and my nature is of such  
 nature that I can scarcely bear  
 with the pain. and also my right hand  
 left shoulder was injured in front  
 of Richmond coming down on my  
 shoulder for to both sides the road  
 for the battery to run on to go  
 to Richmond. they ache and  
 pain just the same as they did  
 30 years ago or I can't treat  
 night with them. All the injuries  
 that I have are the injuries I  
 received in the line of duty. and  
 also the small of back gets away sometimes  
 when I am down I can scarcely get up  
 without help and also my left is  
 injured very bad. I had only one sound  
 limb on me and that is my right
