citizen of Baltimore City and State of Maryland, who are reputable

and entitled to credit, and who being duly sworn, declare in relation to the foregoing case, as follows:

That he became acquainted with Josiah Cornish aforesaid soon after being mustered in the Service of the U.S. in Co D 4th Regt W S C ? and has known him ever since was with the Regiment at Fort Fisher and Sugar Loaf when on the 18th Feb'y 1865 when Corporal Josiah Cornish was wounded in the left shoulder and right breast and remembers when the Regiment was in the defenses around Washington, that Co I and Co D of the 4th Regiment were detailed to Fort Slocum; sometime during the fall of 1865 remained during the winter and remembers that sometime after Christmas they commenced to dismantle "Fort Slocum", and the said Corporal Josiah Cornish was jammed between the wheel of a "Cannon" and the breach of one of the Cannon and was badly injured this he believes was some time in latter part of January 1866. he this affiant was working with Ordnance Sergeant "Cody", and knows that said Cornish was carried to field or Regimental Hospital, and that he is now unable to earn a support on account of said injuries received as aforesaid.

and he further declare that ~~that he has~~ no interest in said case, and is not concerned in its prosecution, and is not related to said applicant.
