DEPOSITION

Case of Joshua Cornish, No. 17491

On this 26 day of Oct., 1895, at Baltimore City, County of Harford, State of Md., before me, John R. Hardwick, a Special Examiner of the Pension Office, personally appeared George Stanley, who, being by me first duly sworn to answer truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this Special Examination of aforesaid pension claim, deposes and says: I am about 55 yrs. old. Laborer. - P.O. 417 N. Dallas St. This City. I served in D & U.S.A. Reg. with Joshua Cornish, here present. We enlisted & came back together. We have known each other since boyhood. He was a perfectly well man when he enlisted. He had diarrhoea when we were fixing fort at Yorktown Va in warm weather in the second year we were in service. We enlisted in 1863 and he was sick in 1864. That was his first sickness. We bunked together & I saw him go to stool. At Ft. Sumner he got pierced by a cannon in 1866 & that injured his breast & back. I knew Clint was wounded in his arm at Sugar Loaf N.C. But I can't now tell the year. But same time Ft. Fisher went up. Clint had piles when we were in North Carolina. That was when I saw his piles but I can't give the year. I don't remember if he had the piles at Petersburg Va. He had dysentery
