Case of *Sophia Chambers*, No 232,482

On this 10<sup>th</sup> day of January, 1881, at Baltimore, County of Baltimore, State of Maryland, before me, *Alving* a Special Agent of the Pension Office, personally appeared *George Graf*, who, being by me duly sworn according to law, declares that his age is 57 years, that he resides at No 212, Orleans St., County of Baltimore, State of Maryland, and that he is by profession and occupation a Carriage maker, being one of the firm of *Graf, Faethe & Seven Korts*, No 33 North Street, Baltimore City Md., and, being examined by me for and on behalf of the Claimant in the above entitled cause, to the general interrogatories propounded by me, deposes and says, — To the 1<sup>st</sup> general interrogatory "Are you acquainted with the Claimant?"

Ans. "Yes, I am well acquainted and was before and after the war, and during the war"

2<sup>d</sup> interrogatory, "Were you acquainted with the Claimant's husband, and if so, say how long you were acquainted with him, and state his full name?"

Ans. "Yes I was acquainted with him, I know his name was Chambers, but I could not give his first name; I have been acquainted with him since 1855."

3<sup>d</sup> interrogatory, "You may go on, Mr Graf, and state all you know about him and about the Claimant, which would be of benefit to her in this claim?"

Ans. "When I first became acquainted with Claimant and her husband they lived in rear of me, in a little court, I lived S.E. Corner of Canal and W<sup>c</sup> Eldery Sts; he was not then called by the common way of speaking of such people, as John, or Jim, like that, but was called
