12" Q - "How do you know that claimant
 has not remarried, or lived and cohabited
 with some man as his wife?"

A - "When I left that place to live where I now
 do in 1867, Oct or Nov. No, it was 1868, she was still
 living there, and since she has moved to where she
 now lives, I have seen her several times, she be-
 longs to the same building Association I do, and
 I think if she had remarried, or had lived or
 cohabited with any one as his wife, I certainly
 would have known of it."

 Claimant to the first or direct interrogatory -
 "Look upon the paper handed you and
 and further declares that he has no interest, direct or indirect, in the claim
 of for a pension; and further saith not.
