

Q "How far away was Chambers house from

all that month, February, 1862, and you not  
have known of it, or nearly all of that month,  
and so sick as to have a doctor every day  
or every other day?"

A "Well, that is twenty two years back, now, he  
may have been sick that way and I not  
have known it, But I do not think he was"

Q "Reflect, now, Mr Graf, and say whether  
or not before the war - or in 1862, or 1863, you  
never knew of or heard of soldier having  
a spell of sickness, when the doctor put plas-  
ter on his back and cupped him?"

A "I can't recollect of it, although it may  
have been done"

Q "Was the Claimant sick (during) that  
period? Do you know?"

A "I don't believe - not to my knowledge,  
although she might have been"

Q "Have you never heard that soldier  
had disease of liver, or of lungs prior to his  
enlistment, or other disease?"

A "I never did, and from the looks I  
did <sup>not</sup> think he did"

Q "Did you at the time know or hear nothing  
of his being sick in Nov-1863?"

A "No, Sir"  
and he further declares that he has no interest, direct or indirect, in the claim  
of Sophia Chambers for a pension; and further saith not.
