Case of *Sophia Chambers*, No. 232,482

On this 11<sup>th</sup> day of February, 1882, at Baltimore, County of Baltimore State of Maryland, before me, A. Morgan a Special Agent of the Pension Office, personally appeared George Graf, who, being by me duly sworn according to law, declares that his age is 57 years, that he resides at No. 212 Orleans St. Baltimore County of Baltimore, State of Maryland, and that he is the same person who testified before me on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of January and again on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of February, 1882, and he now comes and says as follows, to wit:

"I do not know, but I have made a mistake, about what I said in my testimony, about whether John Chambers was sick before the war. Now since I think it over, he may have been sick in 1863, and 1862, and I then not have known it, because I did not see him every day, some days - sometimes for two or three days or more, and he may have been sick then and I not have known of it, and when he came home from the Army, too, I can't say he had consumption then, I can't swear he had a bad cough when he came home from the Army. I only know that when he went away to the Army he looked a great deal better than when he came home."

Q "Do you recollect when he came home from the Army whether he was on furlough or not?"

A "I could not say, I think he was home, once on a furlough, after that he came home to stay home."

Q "What year did he have the furlough in?"

A "That I could not say."

Q "What year did he come home discharged in, if you know?"
