Case of Sophia Chambers, No.

On this 27<sup>th</sup> day of February, 1882 at  
Baltimore City, County of \_\_\_\_\_  
 State of Maryland, before me, A. Morgan  
 a Special Agent of the Pension Office, personally appeared Nathaniel  
Corington <sup>Esq.</sup> the Consecutor, who, being by me duly sworn according to law,  
 declares that his age is 43 years, that he resides at No 27, W. Donogh, St.  
County of Baltimore City, State of Maryland, and that  
 he is a whitewasher by trade, and, being ex-  
 amined by me, he deposes and says as  
 follows, to wit:—

Q "Please state whether you knew in  
 his lifetime one John H. Chambers?"

A "I knew John Chambers, husband of  
 Sophia Chambers, personally, and long be-  
 fore the war, I knew him intimately."

Q "Have you worked in company of him  
 or not, if so, say for what period and for whom?"

A "Oh, yes, Sir, for years. For old man Levi  
 Rowe, he is dead now. He was working there  
 shucking oysters the very day Chambers and  
 my brother enlisted."

Q "When did Chambers enlist?"

A "Can't tell date. It was in war time, I  
 did<sup>nt</sup> enlist same time; but shortly afterwards  
 I was in Co. "G" 23<sup>d</sup> Regt. Chambers was in  
 the 30<sup>th</sup> Regt. Co. "F"."

Q "Do you know what Chambers health  
 was when he enlisted?"

A "He appeared to be healthy. He always  
 was a healthy man. I never knew him  
 to be sick."

Q "Did you never know Chambers to be  
 sick?"

A "No, Sir."
